Ecclesiastes Chapter 8 — Wisdom, Authority, and the Mystery of God's Work

A Verse-by-Verse Bible Study from the Crawford Standard Bible

Introduction

Ecclesiastes Chapter 8 brings together several major themes that have appeared throughout the book:

Wisdom.

Authority.

Human limitation.

Justice.

Death.

Joy.

The mystery of God's work.

The chapter begins by praising wisdom.

Wisdom changes the way a person thinks.

It affects:

Judgment.

Speech.

Conduct.

Even the expression on a person's face.

The Preacher then turns to the subject of authority.

Human rulers possess real power.

Their commands matter.

Their decisions can affect the lives of many people.

Yet no earthly ruler possesses absolute authority.

Kings rule for a time.

God rules forever.

Human authority therefore must always be understood beneath the sovereignty of God.

The chapter also reminds us that human power has strict limits.

No ruler can stop death.

No wealthy person can escape mortality.

No wicked person can use sin itself as a means of final deliverance.

The Preacher then wrestles with another difficult question:

Why does judgment sometimes seem delayed?

Why do wicked people sometimes appear to prosper?

Why do righteous people sometimes suffer consequences that seem more appropriate for the wicked?

Ecclesiastes does not deny these realities.

It faces them honestly.

Yet the Preacher still says:

“Surely I know that it will go well with those who fear God.”

Delayed justice is not absent justice.

God sees.

God knows.

God will judge.

The chapter ends with another reminder of human limitation.

A person may devote:

Day.

Night.

Study.

Observation.

Wisdom.

To trying to understand everything God is doing.

Yet some mysteries remain beyond human comprehension.

The central truth of Ecclesiastes 8 is:

Wisdom teaches us to live carefully under authority, recognize the limits of human power, trust God's ultimate justice, enjoy His daily gifts, and humbly accept that His complete work is beyond human understanding.

I. WISDOM CHANGES A PERSON

Ecclesiastes 8:1 — The Radiance of Wisdom

“Who is like the wise man? Who knows the explanation of a matter? Wisdom brightens a man's face, and softens the hardness of his countenance.”

The Preacher begins with the power of wisdom.

Wisdom is more than information.

It changes a person.

Wisdom gives:

Discernment.

Perspective.

Understanding.

Calmness.

Grace.

A hardened face can be softened by a wiser spirit.

Cross References

Proverbs 4:9

Wisdom will place a beautiful crown of honor upon your head and will give you a gracious and honorable life.

Exodus 34:29

When Moses came down from Mount Sinai carrying the two tablets of God's testimony, he did not realize that his face was shining because he had been speaking with the Lord.

James 3:17

The wisdom that comes from above is first pure, then peace-loving, gentle, reasonable, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial, and sincere.

Spiritual Principle

True wisdom affects both attitude and appearance because it changes the heart.

Key Truth

Wisdom does not merely make a person smarter.

It makes a person steadier.

II. RESPECT AUTHORITY

Ecclesiastes 8:2 — Obey the King's Command

“I say: Obey the king's command, because of the oath before God.”

The Preacher teaches respect for legitimate authority.

Government and civil order matter.

Believers are not called to unnecessary rebellion.

Respect for authority is connected ultimately to accountability before God.

Cross References

Romans 13:1

Every person should submit to governing authorities, because no authority exists apart from God's permission, and the authorities that exist have been allowed by Him.

1 Peter 2:17

Show proper respect to everyone. Love the family of believers. Fear God. Honor the king.

Titus 3:1

Remind believers to submit to rulers and authorities, to obey them, and to be ready to do what is good.

Spiritual Principle

Respect for authority is part of orderly and responsible living.

Application

Obey legitimate authority unless obedience to human authority would require disobedience to God.

III. DO NOT ACT RECKLESSLY BEFORE A RULER

Ecclesiastes 8:3 — Do Not Stand in an Evil Cause

“Do not be hasty to leave his presence, and do not stand in an evil cause, for he does whatever pleases him.”

The Preacher warns against impulsive behavior before powerful rulers.

Wisdom does not act recklessly.

It evaluates consequences.

It refuses to join an evil cause.

Cross References

Proverbs 24:21

My son, fear the Lord and respect the king, and do not join people who are constantly rebelling against proper authority.

Romans 13:2

Whoever rebels against rightful authority is resisting the order God has allowed, and those who persist in such rebellion bring judgment upon themselves.

1 Peter 2:13

For the Lord's sake, submit yourselves to legitimate human authorities, whether to the king as the highest ruler,

Spiritual Principle

Wisdom knows when to speak, when to wait, and when not to become involved in wrongdoing.

IV. A KING'S WORD CARRIES POWER

Ecclesiastes 8:4 — Earthly Authority Is Real

“Since a king's word is supreme, who can say to him, ‘What are you doing?’”

In the ancient world, royal authority could be enormous.

A king's command could determine:

Policy.

Punishment.

Property.

Freedom.

Even life and death.

The verse does not mean a king is morally above questioning.

It emphasizes the practical power rulers possess.

Cross References

Proverbs 16:14

A king's anger can become a messenger of death, but a wise person knows how to calm that anger.

Daniel 4:35

All the people of the earth are like nothing before God. He does according to His will among the armies of heaven and the people of earth. No one can stop His hand or demand, "What are You doing?"

Romans 9:20

But who are you, as a human being, to argue with God? Can something that was made say to its Maker, "Why did You make me this way?"

Spiritual Principle

Human rulers may exercise great authority, but only God possesses unquestionable sovereignty.

V. WISDOM DISCERNS THE PROPER TIME

Ecclesiastes 8:5 — Time and Judgment

"Whoever keeps the command will know no evil thing, and the wise heart knows the proper time and judgment."

Wisdom involves timing.

Something may be:

True.

Necessary.

Right.

But still spoken or done at the wrong time.

The wise person considers both:

What should be done.

And:

When it should be done.

Cross References

Proverbs 19:16

The person who obeys God's commands guards his own life, but the one who lives carelessly brings harm upon himself.

Ecclesiastes 3:1

There is an appointed season for everything and a proper time for every purpose under heaven.

Proverbs 4:7

Wisdom should be your highest pursuit. Therefore, get wisdom, and whatever else you gain, make sure you gain understanding.

Spiritual Principle

Wisdom is not only knowing the right thing.

It is knowing the right time.

VI. EVERY MATTER HAS AN APPOINTED TIME

Ecclesiastes 8:6 — Human Misery and God’s Timing

“For every matter has its proper time and judgment, though the misery of man lies heavy upon him.”

Life contains difficulty.

Human beings often suffer while waiting for answers.

But the Preacher again reminds us:

There is a time.

There is judgment.

There is order beyond what we presently see.

Cross References

Ecclesiastes 3:1

Everything has its season, and every purpose under heaven has an appointed time.

Ecclesiastes 3:17

I said in my heart, “God will judge both the righteous and the wicked, because there is an appointed time for every purpose and every work.”

Job 14:1

A person born into this world has only a short life, and those days are filled with trouble.

Spiritual Principle

Pain may be immediate.

God's full answer may come later.

VII. HUMAN BEINGS DO NOT KNOW THE FUTURE

Ecclesiastes 8:7 — Who Can Tell What Is Coming?

“Since no one knows what will happen, who can tell him what is to come?”

Human beings make plans.

But none of us sees tomorrow perfectly.

We do not know:

Every event.

Every loss.

Every opportunity.

Every change.

Every outcome.

Cross References

James 4:14

You do not know what your life will be like tomorrow. Your life is like a mist that appears briefly and then disappears.

Proverbs 27:1

Do not boast about tomorrow, because you do not know what even one day may bring.

Ecclesiastes 6:12

Who truly knows what is best for a person during the few fleeting days of life that pass like a shadow? And who can tell what will happen on earth after that person is gone?

Spiritual Principle

Uncertainty about tomorrow should produce humility today.

VIII. HUMAN POWER CANNOT STOP DEATH

Ecclesiastes 8:8 — No One Can Retain the Spirit

“No one has power over the spirit to retain it, nor does anyone have power over the day of death. There is no discharge from that war, and wickedness will not deliver those who practice it.”

This is one of the strongest statements in the chapter about human limitation.

No king can command death to leave.

No rich person can buy permanent exemption.

No wicked person can sin his way out of mortality.

Death is a battle from which earthly power gives no exemption.

Cross References

Psalm 89:48

What person can live and never see death? Who can rescue his own life from the power of the grave?

Hebrews 9:27

Every person is appointed to die once, and after death comes judgment.

Ezekiel 18:20

The person who sins will be responsible for his own sin. A child will not bear the guilt of a parent, and a parent will not bear the guilt of a child. The righteous person will answer for righteousness, and the wicked person will answer for wickedness.

Spiritual Principle

Death is the great reminder that human authority has limits.

Key Truth

No one outranks mortality.

IX. POWER CAN HURT BOTH OPPRESSOR AND OPPRESSED

Ecclesiastes 8:9 — One Man Rules Another to His Hurt

“All this I observed, as I applied my heart to everything done under the sun—a time when one man lords it over another to his own hurt.”

Power can be abused.

One person dominates another.

Yet abuse of power eventually harms everyone involved.

It harms the oppressed immediately.

It corrupts the oppressor spiritually.

Cross References

Ecclesiastes 4:1

Again I looked at all the oppression taking place under the sun. I saw the tears of oppressed people with no one to comfort them, while power remained in the hands of those mistreating them.

Romans 13:4

A ruler is intended to serve as God’s servant for good. But if you practice evil, you should take authority seriously because government has power to punish wrongdoing.

Proverbs 28:15

A wicked ruler over helpless people is like a roaring lion or a charging bear.

Spiritual Principle

Authority becomes destructive when service becomes domination.

X. THE WICKED MAY RECEIVE HONOR

Ecclesiastes 8:10 — Praised After Wicked Lives

“Then I saw the wicked buried—they used to go in and out of the holy place and were praised in the city where they had done such things. This too is vanity.”

The Preacher witnesses something disturbing.

Wicked people may receive respectable funerals.

They may even have been connected with religious activity.

Their city may remember them favorably.

Public praise does not always reflect moral truth.

Cross References

Psalm 49:16

Do not be afraid when someone becomes rich or when the glory of his household increases.

Luke 16:22

The poor man died and was carried by angels to a place of comfort with Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried.

Job 21:32

Even a wicked person may be carried to the grave with ceremony, and people may stand watch over his tomb.

Spiritual Principle

Human praise cannot erase divine accountability.

XI. DELAYED JUDGMENT ENCOURAGES SIN

Ecclesiastes 8:11 — Evil Grows When Consequences Seem Slow

“Because the sentence against an evil deed is not carried out quickly, the hearts of men are filled with schemes to do wrong.”

When consequences are delayed, people often assume:

“There will be no consequences.”

That is a dangerous mistake.

God’s patience may be misinterpreted as approval.

Cross References

2 Peter 3:9

The Lord is not slow concerning His promise as some people think of slowness. He is patient, not wanting people to perish but wanting them to come to repentance.

Romans 2:4

Do you treat God’s kindness, patience, and restraint lightly? Do you not understand that His kindness is intended to lead you to repentance?

Psalm 50:21

God says, “You did these things, and because I remained silent for a time, you wrongly assumed that I was like you. But I will correct you and place the truth clearly before you.”

Spiritual Principle

God’s patience is an opportunity to repent, not permission to continue sinning.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Delayed consequences should never be mistaken for cancelled consequences.

XII. IT WILL GO WELL WITH THOSE WHO FEAR GOD

Ecclesiastes 8:12 — The Security of Reverence

“Although a sinner does evil a hundred times and lives long, yet surely I know that it will go well with those who fear God, who stand in awe before Him.”

The Preacher acknowledges the apparent contradiction.

A sinner may:

Sin repeatedly.

Live long.

Appear prosperous.

Yet the Preacher says:

“I know.”

Those who fear God are ultimately secure.

Cross References

Psalm 37:1

Do not become angry or envious because of people who do evil, and do not envy those who practice wrongdoing.

Malachi 3:16

Those who feared the Lord spoke with one another, and the Lord listened and heard them. A book of remembrance was written before Him concerning those who feared Him and honored His name.

Psalm 73:17

I did not understand the prosperity of the wicked until I entered the presence of God; then I understood where their path ultimately leads.

Spiritual Principle

The prosperity of the wicked is temporary.

The security of those who fear God is deeper than temporary circumstances.

XIII. IT WILL NOT GO WELL WITH THE WICKED

Ecclesiastes 8:13 — Life Like a Shadow

“But it will not go well with the wicked, nor will they prolong their days like a shadow, because they do not fear before God.”

The wicked may appear secure.

But their security is temporary.

Their days pass like:

A shadow.

Their lack of reverence for God eventually matters.

Cross References

Psalm 37:20

The wicked will ultimately perish, and the enemies of the Lord will disappear like the beauty of fields that quickly fades. They will vanish like smoke.

Proverbs 10:27

The fear of the Lord tends to lengthen life, but wicked living can shorten a person's days.

Job 15:20

The wicked person lives with inward trouble throughout his days, and the violent person never truly knows how long security will last.

Spiritual Principle

A long life without God is still temporary.

XIV. LIFE SOMETIMES APPEARS UNJUST

Ecclesiastes 8:14 — The Righteous Suffer; the Wicked Prosper

“There is a vanity that occurs on the earth: righteous men who receive what the wicked deserve, and wicked men who receive what the righteous deserve. I said, this too is meaningless.”

The Preacher speaks honestly.

Sometimes life seems completely backwards.

The righteous suffer.

The wicked prosper.

Good people may experience:

Loss.

Pain.

Injustice.

While evil people may experience:

Comfort.

Success.

Honor.

This does not mean God approves of wickedness.

It means present circumstances do not always reveal final justice.

Cross References

Ecclesiastes 9:2

The same earthly events can happen to the righteous and the wicked, to the good and the bad, to the clean and the unclean, to the one who worships and the one who does not.

Job 21:7

Why do wicked people sometimes continue living, become old, and grow increasingly powerful?

Habakkuk 1:13

Your eyes are too pure to approve evil, so why do You tolerate treacherous people? Why do You seem silent when wicked people destroy those more righteous than themselves?

Spiritual Principle

Do not measure God’s justice only by what happens today.

XV. JOY REMAINS A GIFT IN A BROKEN WORLD

Ecclesiastes 8:15 — Eat, Drink, and Be Glad

“So I commend joy, for there is nothing better under the sun for a man than to eat and drink and be glad. Then joy will accompany him in his toil all the days of life that God has given him under the sun.”

This is not careless pleasure.

It is grateful enjoyment.

The Preacher says:

Life is mysterious.

Injustice exists.

Death is certain.

Therefore:

Receive God’s ordinary gifts.

Eat.

Drink.

Work.

Give thanks.

Cross References

Ecclesiastes 2:24

There is nothing better than for a person to eat, drink, and find satisfaction in his work. I saw that this ability to enjoy life comes from the hand of God.

Ecclesiastes 3:13

Everyone should eat, drink, and enjoy the good that comes from his labor, because the ability to enjoy these things is a gift from God.

Ecclesiastes 5:18

I have seen that it is good and fitting for a person to eat, drink, and enjoy the results of his labor during the few days of life God gives him, because this is his portion.

Spiritual Principle

Joy does not require a perfect world.

It requires a grateful heart.

XVI. THE SEARCH FOR WISDOM CAN BECOME EXHAUSTING

Ecclesiastes 8:16 — Day and Night Without Sleep

“When I applied my heart to know wisdom, and to observe the tasks men are busy with on earth—day and night their eyes see no sleep—”

The Preacher has studied life intensely.

He sees people working endlessly.

He also spends great effort trying to understand what everything means.

Human beings can wear themselves out trying to solve every mystery.

Cross References

1 Kings 3:9

Solomon prayed, “Give Your servant an understanding heart so I can lead Your people wisely and recognize the difference between good and evil.”

Ecclesiastes 2:23

A person’s work may fill his days with pain and frustration, and even at night his mind may refuse to rest. This too can become empty.

Proverbs 2:2

Train your ear to listen for wisdom and direct your heart toward understanding.

Spiritual Principle

The pursuit of wisdom is good.

The demand to understand everything is exhausting.

XVII. GOD’S WORK CANNOT BE FULLY COMPREHENDED

Ecclesiastes 8:17 — The Mystery of God

“I saw all the work of God: No man can comprehend what is done under the sun. Though he may labor to search it out, he cannot find it; and even if a wise man claims to know, he cannot truly comprehend it.”

The chapter ends with humility.

The Preacher has studied.

Observed.

Reasoned.

Investigated.

Yet his final conclusion is:

God’s complete work exceeds human understanding.

This does not mean we can understand nothing.

It means we cannot understand everything.

Cross References

Job 5:9

God does great things beyond our ability to search out completely, and He performs wonders beyond number.

Job 37:5

God’s voice thunders in wonderful ways. He does great things that we cannot fully understand.

Romans 11:33

How deep are the riches of God’s wisdom and knowledge! His judgments are beyond our complete understanding, and His ways cannot be fully traced.

Spiritual Principle

Faith does not require knowing everything God knows.

Faith requires trusting the God who knows everything.

Key Truth

Mystery is not proof that God is absent.

Sometimes mystery is evidence that God is greater than us.

XVIII. SEVEN GREAT LESSONS FROM ECCLESIASTES 8

1. Wisdom Changes Perspective

Wisdom affects:

Thought.

Judgment.

Speech.

Attitude.

Principle:

True wisdom changes how a person responds to life.

2. Respect Authority

Human authority has real importance.

Principle:

Respect rightful authority while remembering that God remains the highest authority.

3. Human Power Has Limits

No ruler can:

Control tomorrow.

Prevent death.

Escape accountability.

Principle:

Earthly authority is always temporary.

4. Delayed Judgment Is Not Cancelled Judgment

God's patience may allow sinners time to repent.

Principle:

Never interpret God's delay as God's approval.

5. The Fear of God Is the Safe Path

The wicked may appear successful.

But those who fear God possess a deeper security.

Principle:

Judge life by its final outcome, not merely by its present appearance.

6. Joy Is Still Possible in a Broken World

Injustice exists.

Mystery exists.

Yet God still gives:

Food.

Work.

Daily provision.

Joy.

Principle:

Gratitude is not denial of pain; it is recognition of God's goodness in the middle of pain.

7. God's Work Exceeds Human Understanding

Wisdom can investigate much.

But it cannot explain everything.

Principle:

Humility is part of genuine wisdom.

XIX. WHAT ECCLESIASTES 8 TEACHES ABOUT WISDOM

Wisdom is practical.

It helps a person:

Understand situations.

Respond carefully.

Control reactions.

Respect timing.

Navigate authority.

Wisdom does not eliminate difficulty.

It helps us walk through difficulty more carefully.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Wisdom does not always change the circumstance.

Sometimes wisdom changes the person facing the circumstance.

XX. WHAT ECCLESIASTES 8 TEACHES ABOUT AUTHORITY

Human rulers are real.

Their decisions matter.

Government has legitimate functions.

But human authority is never ultimate.

God remains above every ruler.

Key Truth

Respect authority.

Never worship authority.

XXI. WHAT ECCLESIASTES 8 TEACHES ABOUT DEATH

Death demonstrates the limits of human power.

No person can:

Command the spirit to remain forever.

Dismiss death from duty.

Exempt himself from mortality.

Spiritual Principle

The grave is unimpressed by titles.

XXII. WHAT ECCLESIASTES 8 TEACHES ABOUT JUDGMENT

Judgment may appear delayed.

But God's patience has a purpose.

It gives opportunity for repentance.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

God may delay judgment because He is merciful.

That delay should produce repentance, not greater rebellion.

XXIII. WHAT ECCLESIASTES 8 TEACHES ABOUT INJUSTICE

The righteous may suffer.

The wicked may prosper.

This is one of the great mysteries of life under the sun.

Ecclesiastes does not pretend otherwise.

But present circumstances are not final judgment.

Spiritual Principle

A temporary reversal of justice does not overturn God's eternal justice.

XXIV. WHAT ECCLESIASTES 8 TEACHES ABOUT JOY

Joy appears repeatedly in Ecclesiastes.

Why?

Because the Preacher is teaching us not to postpone all enjoyment until every mystery is solved.

You may never understand everything.

Still:

Give thanks.

Eat.

Work.

Love.

Serve.

Enjoy God's gifts.

Key Truth

You do not need every question answered before you begin thanking God.

XXV. WHAT ECCLESIASTES 8 TEACHES ABOUT MYSTERY

People naturally want explanations.

Why did this happen?

Why did God allow that?

Why does one person suffer?

Why does another prosper?

Why does justice seem delayed?

Some answers may come.

Others may not come in this life.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Do not allow unanswered questions to make you forget the truths God has already revealed.

XXVI. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FOR PERSONAL STUDY

Question 1

What does wisdom do according to verse 1?

Wisdom gives:

Understanding.

Discernment.

A calmer spirit.

A softer response to life.

Question 2

Why should authority be respected?

Because orderly authority has an important role in human society and ultimately exists beneath God's sovereignty.

Question 3

Does respecting authority mean obeying every possible command?

No.

Scripture teaches respect for authority, but God remains the highest authority.

Human commands cannot rightfully require disobedience to God.

Question 4

What does verse 5 teach about wisdom?

Wisdom understands not only what should be done but also the proper timing and judgment for doing it.

Question 5

Why should we be humble about the future?

Because no human being knows everything that tomorrow will bring.

Question 6

What does verse 8 teach about human power?

No person possesses complete control over:

Life.

Death.

The human spirit.

The future.

Question 7

Why can delayed judgment encourage sin?

People may wrongly assume that because consequences have not come quickly, consequences will never come.

Question 8

What is the proper response to God's patience?

Repentance.

God's patience should lead people to turn from sin rather than become more comfortable in it.

Question 9

Why does the Preacher still say it will go well with those who fear God?

Because present circumstances do not reveal the final outcome.

God sees and will ultimately judge rightly.

Question 10

How should we respond when life appears unfair?

We should remain faithful, trust God's final justice, and refuse to judge everything merely by present appearances.

Question 11

Why does the Preacher commend joy?

Because ordinary blessings remain gifts from God even in a world filled with uncertainty and injustice.

Question 12

Can human wisdom fully understand God's work?

No.

Human wisdom can understand much, but God's complete purpose remains beyond our full comprehension.

XXVII. PERSONAL APPLICATION

Ecclesiastes 8 asks several searching questions.

Am I Growing in Wisdom?

Does wisdom make me calmer, kinder, and more discerning?

Do I Respect Legitimate Authority?

Or do I rebel simply because I dislike being told what to do?

Do I Remember That God Is Above Every Human Ruler?

Where does my ultimate allegiance belong?

Am I Pretending I Know the Future?

Do I make plans with humility?

Have I Forgotten My Mortality?

Am I living as though death applies only to others?

Am I Misinterpreting God's Patience?

Have I treated delayed consequences as permission to continue sinning?

Am I Troubled by the Prosperity of the Wicked?

Can I trust God with final justice?

Can I Still Enjoy God's Gifts?

Or have unanswered questions stolen all gratitude?

Do I Need to Understand Everything Before I Trust God?

Can I say:

"I do not know why, but I know God is faithful"?

XXVIII. A CRAWFORD BIBLE STUDY PRINCIPLE

"Delayed Judgment Is Not Denied Judgment"

One of the most dangerous mistakes a person can make is believing:

"Nothing happened, so God must not care."

But God's delay may be mercy.

He may be giving time for:

Repentance.

Change.

Confession.

Restoration.

Principle:

God's patience should soften the heart, not harden it.

XXIX. HUMAN AUTHORITY AND DIVINE AUTHORITY

Ecclesiastes 8 recognizes human rulers.

But it also exposes their limits.

A king can issue commands.

But he cannot command death to stay away.

A ruler can govern people.

But he cannot govern eternity.

A government can enforce laws.

But it cannot overturn God's final judgment.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Every human throne exists beneath the throne of God.

XXX. THE MYSTERY OF GOD'S WORK

The Preacher studies:

History.

Labor.

Authority.

Justice.

Human behavior.

Still he concludes:

God's complete work cannot be fully comprehended.

That statement should not frustrate faith.

It should deepen humility.

We are creatures.

God is Creator.

We see:

A moment.

God sees:

The whole.

We see:

The present.

God sees:

Beginning to end.

We see:

A piece.

God sees:

The entire design.

Spiritual Principle

God does not owe human beings complete explanations before He deserves their trust.

XXXI. FINAL APPLICATION

Ecclesiastes Chapter 8 teaches us how to live when we do not understand everything happening around us.

Use wisdom.

Respect legitimate authority.

Remember that God rules above every authority.

Remain faithful.

When the wicked appear to prosper:

Remain faithful.

When authority seems powerful:

Remember God is greater.

When the future seems uncertain:

Remember God already sees it.

When questions remain unanswered:

Do not stop trusting.
And while you live in this mysterious world:
Receive joy.
Eat with gratitude.
Work with purpose.
Enjoy the blessings God places in your hands.
Do not wait until every problem is solved before you give thanks.
You may never understand everything God is doing.
But you can understand enough to know:
He is God.
You are not.
He sees farther than you.
He knows more than you.
His judgment is wiser than yours.
His timing is better than yours.
His work is greater than your understanding.
Therefore:
Seek wisdom.
