Isaiah Chapter 44 — The Only God and Redeemer

A Verse-by-Verse Bible Study from the Crawford Standard Bible

Introduction

Isaiah Chapter 44 continues the great message of:

Comfort.

Identity.

Redemption.

The Spirit.

The folly of idols.

The sovereignty of God.

The restoration of Jerusalem.

The coming work of Cyrus.

The chapter begins with:

God's chosen servant Israel.

And ends with:

A named pagan ruler whom God will use as an instrument of restoration.

Between those two points, Isaiah emphasizes one central truth:

There is only:

One God.

One Redeemer.

One Rock.

One sovereign Lord over:

Creation.

History.

Prophecy.

Kings.

Nations.

Forgiveness.

Restoration.

The chapter begins tenderly:

“Do not be afraid, O Jacob My servant.”

God reminds Israel:

I made you.

I formed you.

I chose you.

I will help you.

Then He gives a remarkable promise:

“I will pour out My Spirit on your descendants.”

The imagery moves from:

Dry ground.

To:

Water.

From:

Thirst.

To:

Streams.

From:

Spiritual barrenness.

To:

Flourishing life.

The children of Israel will openly say:

“I belong to the Lord.”

Then God declares:

“I am the First and I am the Last; apart from Me there is no God.”

That statement controls the chapter.

Isaiah then launches one of Scripture’s strongest attacks against:

Idolatry.

The satire is deliberate.

A man cuts down:

A tree.

Part of the tree becomes:

Firewood.

He warms himself.

He cooks:

Dinner.

Then from the leftover wood he fashions:

A god.

He bows down.

Prays.

And says:

“Save me! You are my god!”

Isaiah wants us to feel the absurdity.

The same piece of wood becomes:

Fuel.

Food preparation.

Object of worship.

The idol cannot:

Speak.

See.

Think.

Save.

It must be:

Made.

Carried.

Fastened.

Protected.

Yet human beings worship:

What their own hands produced.

Isaiah explains the spiritual tragedy:

“A deluded heart misleads him.”

Idolatry is not merely:

Intellectual error.

It is:

Spiritual deception.

The idolater cannot even say:

“Is not this thing in my right hand a lie?”

Then comes one of the chapter’s most beautiful reversals.

After exposing:

Sin.

Blindness.

Idolatry.

God says:

“I will not forget you.”

Then:

“I have swept away your offenses like a cloud, your sins like the morning mist.”

And:

“Return to Me, for I have redeemed you.”

Grace does not merely say:

Your sin is bad.

Grace says:

Return.

Your sin can be:

Removed.

Then all creation is summoned to:

Sing.

Heavens.

Earth.

Mountains.

Forests.

Trees.

Why?

“The Lord has redeemed Jacob.”

The chapter then closes by returning to:

God’s sovereignty.

He created heaven and earth:

Alone.

He frustrates:

False prophets.

He overturns:

False wisdom.

He fulfills:

His messengers’ words.

He announces:

Jerusalem will be rebuilt.

Judah’s cities restored.

The deep dried.

And then comes one of the most astonishing prophetic statements in Isaiah:

“Cyrus.”

The ruler is:

Named.

God calls him:

“My shepherd.”

Cyrus will accomplish:

God’s purpose.

Jerusalem will be:

Rebuilt.

The temple foundations:

Laid again.

Cyrus is not presented as:

Israel’s Messiah.

He is a pagan ruler whom God sovereignly uses.

The designation “shepherd” describes:

His appointed historical function.

Isaiah 44 therefore moves from:

Chosen Israel.

To:

Spirit-filled restoration.

To:

Exclusive monotheism.

To:

The absurdity of idols.

To:

Forgiveness.

To:

Creation-wide praise.

To:

Prophetic sovereignty.

To:

Cyrus.

The central truth of Isaiah 44 is:

The Lord alone is Israel’s Creator, King, Redeemer, Rock, and sovereign God; He promises His Spirit upon future generations, exposes idols as powerless products of human hands, sweeps away the sins of His people, calls them to return, and demonstrates His control over history by announcing restoration and naming Cyrus as the ruler who will accomplish His purpose concerning Jerusalem and the temple.

I. “HEAR THIS, O JACOB MY SERVANT”

Isaiah 44:1 — Chosen by God

“But now hear this, O Jacob My servant, Israel, whom I have chosen.”

God again addresses:

His servant.

His chosen people.

Isaiah 43 had exposed:

Sin.

Now Isaiah 44 opens with:

Grace.

Cross References

Isaiah 41:8

God had already called Israel His servant, Jacob His chosen one, and the offspring of Abraham His friend.

Deuteronomy 7:6

Israel was set apart as a people belonging to the Lord and chosen for covenant relationship.

John 15:16

Jesus reminds His disciples that they did not ultimately choose Him first; He chose and appointed them for fruitfulness.

Spiritual Principle

God’s calling is rooted in:

His grace.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

The servant's security begins with the One who chose the servant.

II. FORMED IN THE WOMB AND HELPED BY GOD

Isaiah 44:2 — “Do Not Be Afraid”

“This is what the Lord says—the One who made you, who formed you in the womb, and who will help you: Do not be afraid, O Jacob My servant, O Jeshurun, whom I have chosen.”

God gives three assurances:

I made you.

I formed you.

I will help you.

“Jeshurun” is an affectionate covenant designation for:

Israel.

Cross References

Jeremiah 1:5

God told Jeremiah that He knew him before birth and appointed his calling before he entered public life.

Psalms 139:13

The psalmist praises God for forming human life within the womb.

Deuteronomy 33:26

Jeshurun is reminded that no one compares with the God who rides the heavens to help His people.

Spiritual Principle

The God who formed you is not:

Indifferent to you.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

If God cared enough to form you, He is not too distant to help you.

III. WATER ON THIRSTY GROUND

Isaiah 44:3 — The Spirit Poured Out

“For I will pour water on the thirsty land, and streams on the dry ground. I will pour out My Spirit on your descendants, and My blessing on your offspring.”

Two parallel pictures:

Water on:

Dry land.

Spirit on:

Future generations.

The physical imagery points toward:

Spiritual renewal.

Cross References

Joel 2:28

God promises to pour out His Spirit upon sons, daughters, young, old, and servants.

Acts 2:17

Peter quotes Joel’s promise at Pentecost, identifying the outpouring of the Spirit as part of God’s last-days work.

John 7:38

Jesus speaks of living water flowing from those who believe in Him, which John connects with the Spirit.

Spiritual Principle

The Spirit brings life where there was:

Dryness.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

God does not merely command dry ground to become fruitful.

He pours out what makes fruitfulness possible.

IV. THEY WILL SPRING UP BESIDE STREAMS

Isaiah 44:4 — Flourishing Descendants

“They will spring up like grass in a meadow, like willows by flowing streams.”

The result of:

Water.

Spirit.

Blessing.

Is:

Growth.

Cross References

Psalm 1:3

The righteous person is like a tree planted beside streams of water, fruitful and enduring.

Psalm 92:12

The righteous flourish like a palm tree and grow strong like a cedar.

Jeremiah 17:8

The person trusting in the Lord is like a tree by water whose leaves remain green even during heat.

Spiritual Principle

Spiritual flourishing requires:

Divine supply.

V. “I BELONG TO THE LORD”

Isaiah 44:5 — Open Identification with God

“One will say, ‘I belong to the Lord’; another will call himself by the name of Jacob; another will write on his hand, ‘The Lord’s,’ and take the name Israel.”

The renewed generation willingly identifies with:

God.

No embarrassment.

No divided loyalty.

They say:

The Lord's.

Cross References

Galatians 3:29

Those who belong to Christ are described as Abraham's offspring and heirs according to promise.

Revelation 7:3

God's servants are marked as belonging to Him before judgment proceeds.

Exodus 13:9

Israel was given visible reminders so God's saving acts and instruction would remain before them.

Spiritual Principle

Grace produces:

Belonging.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

True renewal does not merely say:

"God belongs to me."

It gladly says:

"I belong to God."

VI. THE FIRST AND THE LAST

Isaiah 44:6 — There Is No Other God

"This is what the Lord says—Israel's King and Redeemer, the Lord Almighty: 'I am the First and I am the Last; apart from Me there is no God.'"

God identifies Himself as:

King.

Redeemer.

Lord Almighty.

First.

Last.

Only God.

Cross References

Revelation 1:17

Christ identifies Himself as the First and the Last.

Isaiah 41:4

The Lord had already declared Himself the First and the One present with the last generations.

Revelation 22:13

Christ declares Himself the Alpha and Omega, First and Last, Beginning and End.

Spiritual Principle

God is not:

One among many.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

There is no divine competition because there is no second God.

VII. “WHO IS LIKE ME?”

Isaiah 44:7 — Predict the Future

“Who is like Me? Let him proclaim it. Let him declare and set it out before Me, since I appointed an ancient people. Let them foretell the things to come, what is yet to take place.”

God issues a challenge.

If there is another God:

Speak.

Predict.

Prove it.

Cross References

Isaiah 46:9

God calls His people to remember that He alone is God and none compares with Him.

Exodus 15:11

Moses asks who among supposed gods is like the Lord, majestic in holiness and wonders.

Isaiah 41:22

The idols had already been challenged to explain past events and declare future ones.

Spiritual Principle

God's knowledge of history proves:

His sovereignty over history.

VIII. THERE IS NO OTHER ROCK

Isaiah 44:8 — God's Witnesses Need Not Fear

"Do not tremble, do not be afraid. Did I not proclaim this long ago and declare it? You are My witnesses. Is there any God besides Me? No, there is no other Rock; I know of none."

Again:

Do not fear.

Why?

There is:

One Rock.

Cross References

Deuteronomy 32:4

God is called the Rock whose work is perfect and whose ways are just.

2 Samuel 22:32

David asks who is God besides the Lord and who is a rock besides God.

Isaiah 41:10

God had already told His people not to fear because He is with them, strengthening and upholding them.

Spiritual Principle

Fear decreases when:

God's uniqueness becomes clear.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

When everything else shifts, stand on the Rock who has no rival.

IX. IDOL MAKERS ARE NOTHING

Isaiah 44:9 — Treasured Idols Are Worthless

“All who make idols are nothing, and the things they treasure are worthless. Those who would speak up for them are blind; they are ignorant, to their own shame.”

Idolatry reverses:

Value.

People treasure:

Worthless things.

Then become:

Blind.

Cross References

Psalm 115:4

The idols of the nations are silver and gold, merely the work of human hands.

Jeremiah 10:14

Those who make idols become foolish because the image contains no life or truth.

1 Corinthians 8:4

Paul states that an idol has no true divine existence and there is only one God.

Spiritual Principle

We become spiritually distorted when we assign ultimate value to:

Worthless substitutes.

X. WHO MAKES A GOD?

Isaiah 44:10 — The Absurdity of Manufactured Deity

“Who shapes a god and casts an idol, which can profit him nothing?”

The question exposes:

Contradiction.

If you:

Shape it.

How is it:

Your Creator?

Cross References

Habakkuk 2:18

A carved image cannot truly teach because its maker has trusted in his own creation.

Jeremiah 2:11

God condemns people who exchange their true glory for something that cannot profit.

Psalms 115:4

Idols are human craftsmanship, not living gods.

Spiritual Principle

The maker cannot sensibly worship:

What he made.

XI. THE CRAFTSMEN WILL BE ASHAMED

Isaiah 44:11 — Human Makers, Human Limitations

“Look, all his associates will be put to shame; the craftsmen are only human. Let them all come together and take their stand; they will be brought down to terror and disgrace.”

Isaiah reminds us:

The craftsman is:

Human.

The idol is:

Less than its maker.

Cross References

Isaiah 45:16

Idol makers are destined for shame when the true God reveals Himself.

Jeremiah 10:14

The maker becomes foolish because what he produces has no breath.

Isaiah 1:29

Those who trusted corrupt worship practices would eventually be ashamed of what they had chosen.

Spiritual Principle

Anything made by limited humans cannot become:

Unlimited God.

XII. THE BLACKSMITH GROWS TIRED

Isaiah 44:12 — The Maker Is Weaker Than the God He Pretends to Make

“The blacksmith takes a tool and works it in the coals; he shapes an idol with hammers, forging it with the strength of his arms. He gets hungry and loses his strength; he drinks no water and grows faint.”

What irony.

The man making:

The god.

Gets:

Hungry.

Thirsty.

Weak.

Cross References

Jeremiah 10:9

Idols are assembled through the work of craftsmen using metals and decorative materials.

Exodus 32:4

Aaron fashioned the golden calf from donated gold and the people treated the manufactured object as divine.

Isaiah 40:19

Isaiah previously described the craftsman casting an idol and the goldsmith covering it.

Spiritual Principle

A tired man cannot create:

An untiring God.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

The idol cannot be greater than the exhausted hands that made it.

XIII. THE CARPENTER DESIGNS HIS GOD

Isaiah 44:13 — Made in Human Form

“The carpenter measures with a line and marks out an outline with a marker; he shapes it with chisels and marks it with a compass. He makes it in the form of a man, in human beauty, to dwell in a shrine.”

The idol is:

Measured.

Marked.

Shaped.

Designed.

Human likeness is projected:

Onto deity.

Cross References

Jeremiah 10:3

A craftsman cuts and shapes wood according to human skill.

Isaiah 40:20

A craftsman carefully constructs an idol designed not to fall.

Deuteronomy 4:16

Israel was warned not to corrupt worship by making carved images in human form.

Spiritual Principle

Idolatry often makes god in:

Our image.

Rather than worshiping the God who made us in:

His.

XIV. THE TREE GROWS BY GOD’S RAIN

Isaiah 44:14 — The Idol Depends on God Before It Exists

“He cuts down cedars, or perhaps takes a cypress or an oak. He lets it grow among the trees of the forest, or plants a pine, and the rain makes it grow.”

Before the idol exists:

God provides the tree.

God sends:

Rain.

The irony deepens.

Cross References

Isaiah 40:20

Wood is selected for an idol and shaped by skilled craftsmanship.

Jeremiah 10:3

A tree is cut from the forest and worked by human hands.

Psalms 104:16

The trees are watered and sustained by God’s provision.

Spiritual Principle

The material used to manufacture an idol exists only because:

God created and sustained it.

XV. ONE TREE: FIREWOOD AND “GOD”

Isaiah 44:15 — The Absurd Division

“It is used for fuel for burning; some of it he takes and warms himself, he kindles a fire and bakes bread. But he also fashions a god and worships it; he makes an idol and bows down to it.”

One tree.

Part:

Firewood.

Part:

God.

That is Isaiah's point.

Cross References

Jeremiah 10:8

Idolatrous instruction is exposed as foolish because the object worshiped is merely wood.

Deuteronomy 4:28

Israel was warned that exile would expose them to gods made by human hands that cannot see, hear, eat, or smell.

Habakkuk 2:19

Woe is pronounced on anyone who asks wood and stone to awaken and guide.

Spiritual Principle

Idolatry takes:

Ordinary creation.

And gives it:

Ultimate devotion.

XVI. HALF THE WOOD COOKS DINNER

Isaiah 44:16 — The Fire Is Useful; the Idol Is Not

“Half of the wood he burns in the fire; over it he prepares his meal, he roasts his meat and eats his fill. He warms himself and says, ‘Ah! I am warm; I see the fire.’”

The wood actually has:

Legitimate usefulness.

Heat.

Cooking.

But then humans demand from it:

Divinity.

Cross References

Jeremiah 10:5

Idols cannot move or act and must be carried.

Psalm 115:5

Idols possess mouths but cannot speak.

Habakkuk 2:19

A silent piece of wood cannot truly awaken or reveal truth.

Spiritual Principle

A created thing can be useful without being:

Worthy of worship.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Good gifts become idols when we ask them to do what only God can do.

XVII. “SAVE ME! YOU ARE MY GOD!”

Isaiah 44:17 — The Leftover Wood Becomes Savior

“From the rest he makes a god, his idol; he bows down to it and worships. He prays to it and says, ‘Save me! You are my god!’”

This is Isaiah’s climax.

The worshiper asks:

The leftover wood.

To:

Save him.

Cross References**Judges 10:14**

God sarcastically tells Israel to cry to the gods they chose and see whether those gods can rescue them.

Jeremiah 2:28

God asks where Judah’s manufactured gods are when trouble comes and challenges them to arise and save.

Psalm 115:5

Idols have mouths but cannot speak and therefore cannot answer prayer.

Spiritual Principle

Every idol eventually receives a request:

“Save me.”

And fails.

XVIII. SPIRITUAL BLINDNESS

Isaiah 44:18 — Eyes Shut, Minds Closed

“They know nothing, they understand nothing; their eyes are plastered shut so they cannot see, and their minds closed so they cannot understand.”

Idolatry produces:

Darkness.

Cross References

Isaiah 6:10

Persistent rebellion can lead to hardened perception and spiritual dullness.

2 Corinthians 4:4

Paul describes minds blinded so that the light of the gospel is not perceived.

Psalms 135:16

Idols have mouths but do not speak, eyes but do not see, and those who trust them become spiritually like them.

Spiritual Principle

False worship damages:

Spiritual perception.

XIX. “NO ONE STOPS TO THINK”

Isaiah 44:19 — The Missing Step

“No one stops to think, no one has the knowledge or understanding to say, ‘Half of it I used for fuel; I even baked bread over its coals, I roasted meat and I ate. Shall I make a detestable thing from what is left? Shall I bow down to a block of wood?’”

The problem is:

Failure to reflect.

Isaiah says:

Stop.

Think.

Cross References

Romans 1:21

Human beings can know something of God yet become futile in reasoning when they refuse to honor Him.

Jeremiah 10:8

Idolatry is exposed as senseless instruction centered on wood.

Isaiah 46:8

God later tells idolaters to remember, think carefully, and take truth to heart.

Spiritual Principle

Many idols survive because people never:

Question them honestly.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

One of the first steps out of deception is:

Stop and think.

XX. FEEDING ON ASHES

Isaiah 44:20 — “Is This Thing a Lie?”

“He feeds on ashes, a deluded heart misleads him; he cannot save himself, or say, ‘Is not this thing in my right hand a lie?’”

The idolater consumes:

Ashes.

Trusts:

A lie.

Cannot save:

Himself.

Cross References

Romans 1:25

People exchange God's truth for a lie and worship created things rather than the Creator.

Isaiah 44:9

Idols and the objects people treasure prove worthless.

Habakkuk 2:18

Trust in a carved image is trust in falsehood.

Spiritual Principle

Idolatry is:

Self-deception.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

The most dangerous lie may be the one we hold so tightly that we stop asking whether it is true.

XXI. "I WILL NOT FORGET YOU"

Isaiah 44:21 — Remember Who You Are

"Remember these things, Jacob, for you, Israel, are My servant. I have made you, you are My servant; Israel, I will not forget you."

After twenty verses of:

Warning.

Idolatry.

Foolishness.

God says:

I will not forget.

Cross References

Isaiah 49:15

God says His remembrance of His people is stronger even than a mother's natural attachment to her child.

Isaiah 43:1

The Lord tells Israel that He created, redeemed, called, and claimed them.

Deuteronomy 4:31

God will not abandon or destroy His covenant people or forget His covenant.

Spiritual Principle

God's remembrance is stronger than:

Israel's failure.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

The people who forget God are still addressed by the God who says:

"I will not forget you."

XXII. SINS SWEEP AWAY LIKE CLOUDS

Isaiah 44:22 — "Return to Me"

"I have swept away your offenses like a cloud, your sins like the morning mist. Return to Me, for I have redeemed you."

What imagery.

Cloud:

Gone.

Morning mist:

Vanished.

Sin:

Removed.

Then:

Return.

Cross References

Isaiah 1:18

Though sins are scarlet, God promises cleansing that makes them white as snow.

Colossians 2:14

God cancels the record of debt that stood against His people.

Jeremiah 3:12

God calls His unfaithful people to return because He is merciful.

Spiritual Principle

Forgiveness creates:

A road home.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

God does not say:

“Clean yourself up and then return.”

He says:

“I have redeemed you—return.”

XXIII. ALL CREATION IS CALLED TO SING

Isaiah 44:23 — Redemption Deserves Cosmic Praise

“Sing for joy, you heavens, for the Lord has done this; shout aloud, you earth beneath. Burst into song, you mountains, you forests and all your trees, for the Lord has redeemed Jacob, He displays His glory in Israel.”

Heavens.

Earth.

Mountains.

Forests.

Trees.

All:

Sing.

Cross References

Psalm 96:11

Heaven and earth are called to rejoice in the Lord’s righteous rule.

Isaiah 55:12

Mountains, hills, and trees are poetically pictured rejoicing at God’s restoration.

Psalm 98:4

All the earth is summoned to shout joyfully and sing praise.

Spiritual Principle

Redemption is:

Worship-worthy.

XXIV. THE REDEEMER IS ALSO CREATOR

Isaiah 44:24 — “I Made All Things”

“This is what the Lord says—your Redeemer, who formed you in the womb: ‘I am the Lord, the Maker of all things, who stretches out the heavens by Myself, who spreads out the earth by My own hand,’”

God alone:

Creates.

This destroys:

Idolatry.

No idol helped.

No rival assisted.

Cross References

Job 9:8

God alone stretches out the heavens and rules creation.

Psalms 104:2

God is pictured stretching out the heavens like a curtain.

Jeremiah 10:12

The Lord made the earth by His power and established the world by His wisdom.

Spiritual Principle

The Redeemer has the power to restore because He is:

Creator.

XXV. GOD EXPOSES FALSE PROPHETS

Isaiah 44:25 — Human Wisdom Overturned

“Who foils the signs of false prophets and makes fools of diviners, who overthrows the learning of the wise and turns it into nonsense,”

God exposes:

False spiritual claims.

False predictions.

False wisdom.

Cross References

1 Corinthians 1:20

Paul asks where human wisdom stands when God exposes the world's wisdom as unable to save.

Jeremiah 50:36

False wise men and deceivers are brought to shame under divine judgment.

Deuteronomy 18:22

A false prophet is exposed when predictions claimed in God's name do not come to pass.

Spiritual Principle

God does not fear:

Human claims to wisdom.

XXVI. GOD FULFILLS HIS SERVANTS' WORDS

Isaiah 44:26 — Jerusalem Will Be Rebuilt

“Who carries out the words of His servants and fulfills the predictions of His messengers, who says of Jerusalem, ‘It shall be inhabited,’ of the towns of Judah, ‘They shall be rebuilt,’ and of their ruins, ‘I will restore them,’”

False prophets:

Fail.

God's messengers:

Vindicated.

Jerusalem:

Rebuilt.

Judah:

Restored.

Cross References

Jeremiah 30:18

God promises restoration of Jacob's dwellings and rebuilding after judgment.

Zechariah 1:16

God declares that He will return to Jerusalem with mercy and that the city will be rebuilt.

2 Peter 1:19

Prophetic revelation is described as a reliable word deserving careful attention.

Spiritual Principle

Ruins do not mean:

God's promise is ruined.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

God can speak "rebuilt" over what presently looks destroyed.

XXVII. GOD SPEAKS TO THE DEEP

Isaiah 44:27 — Waters Obey

"Who says to the watery deep, 'Be dry, and I will dry up your streams,'"

God commands:

Waters.

This recalls:

Exodus.

And anticipates:

Deliverance from Babylon.

Cross References

Exodus 14:21

God dried the sea so Israel could pass through.

Jeremiah 51:36

God promises judgment against Babylon and speaks of drying her sea and springs.

Isaiah 11:15

God is pictured drying waters to create a pathway for His returning people.

Spiritual Principle

What looks like an uncrossable barrier can become:

Dry ground.

XXVIII. CYRUS IS NAMED

Isaiah 44:28 — “He Is My Shepherd”

“Who says of Cyrus, ‘He is My shepherd and will accomplish all that I please; he will say of Jerusalem, “Let it be rebuilt,” and of the temple, “Let its foundations be laid.”””

This is one of Isaiah’s most striking prophetic declarations.

The ruler is:

Named.

Cyrus.

He is called:

“My shepherd.”

That does not mean:

He is spiritually equivalent to Israel’s Messiah.

It means:

God assigns him a historical role.

He will accomplish:

God’s purpose.

Jerusalem:

Rebuilt.

Temple:

Foundations laid.

Cross References

2 Chronicles 36:22

Cyrus later issues a proclamation permitting the return and rebuilding in Jerusalem.

Ezra 1:1

God moves Cyrus to decree that the Lord's house in Jerusalem be rebuilt.

Ezekiel 34:23

Security.

Meaning.

Salvation.

Then Isaiah says the idolater cannot even ask:

“Is not this thing in my right hand a lie?”

That may be one of the most important questions in the chapter.

What are you holding?

What are you trusting?

What are you afraid to lose?

What promise have you believed?

Could it be:

A lie?

Then suddenly God says:

“I will not forget you.”

How beautiful.

You forgot:

Me.

I will not forget:

You.

Then:

“I have swept away your offenses like a cloud.”

Imagine looking at:

A dark cloud.

Then the wind:

Moves.

The sky:

Clears.

That is God’s picture of:

Forgiveness.

Then:

“Return to Me.”

That is the goal.

Not merely:

Feel less guilty.

Return to:

God.

Then everything starts:

Singing.

Heaven.

Earth.

Mountains.

Trees.

Why?

Because:

Redemption deserves a song.

Then the chapter ends with:

History.

False prophets cannot:

Predict accurately.

Idols cannot:

Central Truth

Isaiah declares that the Lord who formed and chose Israel will pour out His Spirit and blessing on future generations, that He alone is the First, the Last, the Rock, and the only God, that idols are absurd and powerless products of human hands, that He graciously sweeps away His people's sins and calls them to return, and that as sovereign Creator and Redeemer He will fulfill His prophetic Word by rebuilding Jerusalem and using Cyrus as His appointed shepherd to advance that restoration.
