Isaiah Chapter 32 — A Righteous King and the Outpouring of the Spirit

A Verse-by-Verse Bible Study from the Crawford Standard Bible

Introduction

Isaiah Chapter 32 presents a dramatic contrast between:

Righteous leadership.

Corrupt character.

Careless complacency.

Divine judgment.

The transforming work of the Spirit.

Peace.

The chapter begins with:

A King.

But not merely:

Any king.

Isaiah says:

“A king will reign in righteousness.”

This ruler governs with:

Justice.

Integrity.

Protection.

Stability.

The chapter therefore looks beyond Judah’s imperfect rulers toward the ideal reign of:

The Messiah.

Its language fits the larger Isaianic hope of the righteous Davidic King already described in:
Isaiah 9.

Isaiah 11.

Under righteous rule:

People are protected.

Spiritual blindness is removed.

Understanding increases.

Speech becomes clear.

False labels disappear.

A fool will no longer be praised as:

Noble.

A miser will no longer be celebrated as:

Generous.

Why?

Because righteous rule exposes:

Character.

Truth is no longer manipulated by:

Titles.

Reputation.

Appearance.

The fool is known by:

Folly.

The selfish schemer is known by:

Injustice.

The noble person is known by:

Noble plans.

Noble deeds.

Then the chapter abruptly addresses:

Careless women.

These women represent people living with:

Ease.

Security.

Complacency.

They assume:

Tomorrow will look like today.

But Isaiah warns that:

Harvest will fail.

Fruitfulness will disappear.

Fields will become:

Thorns.

Briers.

The bustling city will become:

Desolate.

Yet the devastation is not the end.

One word changes the direction of the chapter:

“Until.”

Desolation continues:

“Until the Spirit is poured out on us from on high.”

That is the turning point.

The Spirit transforms:

Desert.

Into:

Fertile field.

Justice dwells where there was disorder.

Righteousness flourishes.

Peace becomes the fruit of righteousness.

Quietness and confidence replace:

Fear.

God’s people live in:

Secure homes.

Undisturbed places of rest.

The chapter ends with:

Blessing.

Sowing.

Fruitfulness.

Freedom.

The central truth of Isaiah 32 is:

The righteous reign of God's appointed King exposes false character, protects the vulnerable, warns the complacent, and prepares the way for the Spirit's transforming work, through which barrenness becomes fruitfulness, righteousness produces peace, and God's people dwell in lasting security.

I. A KING WILL REIGN IN RIGHTEOUSNESS

Isaiah 32:1 — The Righteous King

“Behold, a king will reign in righteousness, and princes will rule with justice.”

Isaiah begins with:

Leadership.

The king does not merely:

Rule.

He rules:

Righteously.

The princes do not merely:

Exercise authority.

They govern with:

Justice.

This is leadership as God intended it.

Cross References

Jeremiah 23:5

God promises to raise up a righteous Branch from David's line who will reign wisely and practice justice and righteousness in the land.

Psalms 72:2

The ideal king is asked to judge God's people with righteousness and defend the oppressed with justice.

Isaiah 9:7

The promised Davidic ruler will establish an everlasting kingdom upheld by justice and righteousness.

Spiritual Principle

The quality of leadership is measured not merely by:

Power.

Popularity.

Success.

But by:

Righteousness.

Justice.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

A ruler becomes great in God's eyes when power is governed by righteousness.

II. RIGHTEOUS LEADERSHIP PROVIDES SHELTER

Isaiah 32:2 — Refuge in a Weary Land

“Each one will be like a shelter from the wind, a refuge from the storm, like streams of water in a dry land, like the shade of a great rock in a weary land.”

Godly leadership should become:

Shelter.

Refuge.

Water.

Shade.

Notice the imagery.

Leadership is not pictured mainly as:

Privilege.

Status.

Recognition.

It is:

Protection.

Refreshment.

Relief.

Cross References

Isaiah 25:4

God is described as a refuge for the poor, a stronghold for the needy, a shelter from the storm, and shade from oppressive heat.

Psalms 61:3

God is praised as a refuge and strong tower against the enemy.

Isaiah 4:6

God provides shelter and shade from heat and protection from storm and rain.

Spiritual Principle

Leadership should make vulnerable people:

Safer.

Not:

More exposed.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Godly authority becomes shade for the weary rather than heat upon them.

III. BLIND EYES BEGIN TO SEE

Isaiah 32:3 — Spiritual Perception Restored

“Then the eyes of those who see will no longer be dim, and the ears of those who hear will listen.”

Righteous rule produces:

Clarity.

Those with eyes:

Actually see.

Those with ears:

Actually listen.

The issue is:

Spiritual perception.

Cross References

Isaiah 29:18

Isaiah promises that the deaf will hear the words of the scroll and the blind will see out of gloom and darkness.

Isaiah 35:5

The eyes of the blind will be opened and the ears of the deaf unstopped under God's restoring work.

Matthew 13:16

Jesus calls His disciples blessed because their eyes see and their ears hear the truth of God's kingdom.

Spiritual Principle

God's rule produces:

Sight.

Hearing.

Understanding.

IV. THE RECKLESS GAIN UNDERSTANDING

Isaiah 32:4 — Confusion Gives Way to Clarity

“The hearts of the reckless will understand knowledge, and the tongues of the stammering will speak clearly.”

The reckless were previously:

Hasty.

Thoughtless.

Unwise.

Now:

They understand.

Speech once:

Confused.

Becomes:

Clear.

Cross References

Isaiah 35:6

Under God's restoration, disabilities are overcome and the tongue that could not speak properly breaks into joyful expression.

Exodus 4:10

Moses describes himself as slow of speech and tongue, yet God reminds him that speech itself remains under divine authority.

James 1:19

Believers are urged to be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to anger.

Spiritual Principle

God can transform:

Impulsive thinking.

Confused speech.

Into:

Wisdom.

Clarity.

V. FALSE HONOR WILL END

Isaiah 32:5 — Fools No Longer Called Noble

“No longer will fools be called noble, nor the miser said to be generous.”

Righteous society refuses to:

Rename evil.

Flatter corruption.

Call selfishness generosity.

Call foolishness nobility.

Cross References

Proverbs 17:7

Fine speech does not fit a fool, and dishonesty is even more inappropriate for one claiming honorable status.

Isaiah 5:20

Isaiah pronounces woe upon those who call evil good and good evil, reversing moral categories.

Job 30:8

Job describes foolish and dishonorable people whose character does not match any claim to nobility.

Spiritual Principle

Truthful leadership restores:

Moral vocabulary.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

One mark of moral decline is calling vice virtue and foolishness wisdom.

VI. THE FOOL REVEALS HIS CHARACTER

Isaiah 32:6 — Folly, Ungodliness, and Neglect

“For the fool speaks folly, and his heart plots evil: to practice ungodliness, to speak error against the Lord, to starve the hungry of food and deprive the thirsty of drink.”

The fool is not merely:

Uneducated.

Socially awkward.

Intellectually limited.

Biblical folly is:

Moral.

Spiritual.

The fool:

Plots evil.

Speaks falsely about God.

Neglects the hungry.

Deprives the thirsty.

Cross References

Proverbs 15:2

Wise speech uses knowledge properly, while foolish speech pours out ignorance and folly.

Ezekiel 34:2

God condemns shepherds who feed themselves while neglecting the flock they were supposed to care for.

Isaiah 3:14

God brings judgment against leaders who have consumed what belonged to His people and oppressed the poor.

Spiritual Principle

A fool can be identified by:

What he says.

What he plans.

How he treats the vulnerable.

VII. THE MISER USES SCHEMES AGAINST THE POOR

Isaiah 32:7 — Injustice by Design

“The miser’s schemes are evil; he plans wickedness to ruin the poor with lies, even when the plea of the needy is just.”

This is not accidental injustice.

It is:

Planned.

Calculated.

Strategic.

The poor person may have:

A legitimate case.

Still:

Lies are used against him.

Cross References

Amos 5:12

God knows those who oppress the righteous, accept bribes, and deny justice to the poor.

Proverbs 6:18

Among the things God hates is a heart that plans wicked schemes.

Micah 2:1

Woe is pronounced upon those who plan evil while lying awake and then carry it out because they possess the power to do so.

Spiritual Principle

God judges not only evil actions.

He judges:

The plans behind them.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Power becomes corrupt when it learns how to turn lies into policy.

VIII. THE NOBLE PERSON MAKES NOBLE PLANS

Isaiah 32:8 — Character Revealed in Action

“But the noble person makes noble plans, and by noble deeds they will stand.”

The contrast is:

Clear.

Fool:

Folly.

Miser:

Schemes.

Noble person:

Noble plans.

Noble deeds.

True nobility is:

Character.

Not title.

Cross References

Proverbs 16:12

Righteousness establishes leadership because wickedness is incompatible with a stable throne.

Philippians 4:8

Believers are called to fill their minds with what is true, honorable, just, pure, lovely, and worthy of praise.

Proverbs 12:5

The plans of righteous people are just, while the advice of the wicked is deceptive.

Spiritual Principle

Noble deeds begin with:

Noble intentions.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

True nobility is not inherited in a name.

It is revealed in a life.

IX. CARELESS EASE RECEIVES A WARNING

Isaiah 32:9 — Listen, You Careless Ones

“Rise up, you women who live in ease; hear my voice, you daughters who live carelessly; listen to what I say.”

Isaiah addresses:

Women living comfortably.

But the spiritual issue is broader:

Complacency.

They feel:

Safe.

Untroubled.

Secure.

Isaiah says:

Listen.

Cross References

Isaiah 3:16

Isaiah previously confronted the proud daughters of Zion for arrogance, luxury, and self-display during national spiritual decline.

Amos 4:1

Amos condemns wealthy, complacent women who enjoy luxury while benefiting from the oppression of the poor.

Isaiah 28:23

God calls His people to listen carefully, pay attention, and hear the message He is giving.

Spiritual Principle

Comfort can become dangerous when it produces:

Spiritual sleep.

X. FALSE SECURITY WILL BE SHAKEN

Isaiah 32:10 — Harvest Failure

“In little more than a year you who feel secure will tremble; the grape harvest will fail, and the fruit crop will not come.”

They feel:

Secure.

Isaiah says:

You will tremble.

What they assume will always come:

Harvest.

Fruit.

Provision.

Will fail.

Cross References

Habakkuk 3:17

Even when the fig tree fails, vines produce no fruit, crops disappear, and livestock are gone, faith can still choose to rejoice in God.

Joel 1:11

Farmers and vineyard workers mourn because grain and fruit crops have been destroyed.

Isaiah 24:7

Wine dries up, vines wither, and those who depended upon earthly celebration begin to groan.

Spiritual Principle

Complacency assumes tomorrow belongs to us.

Faith knows tomorrow belongs to:

God.

XI. THE CARELESS ARE TOLD TO MOURN

Isaiah 32:11 — Sackcloth Replaces Comfort

“Tremble, you women who live in ease; shudder, you careless ones. Strip yourselves bare, and put sackcloth around your waists.”

Ease gives way to:

Trembling.

Carelessness to:

Mourning.

Luxury to:

Sackcloth.

Cross References

Joel 1:8

The people are called to mourn deeply like someone grieving a devastating personal loss.

Isaiah 3:24

Luxury and beauty are replaced by mourning, humiliation, and loss under judgment.

Jeremiah 4:8

People are called to wear sackcloth, mourn, and cry because judgment has not turned away.

Spiritual Principle

There are times when repentance requires:

Grief.

Not entertainment.

XII. FRUITFUL FIELDS BECOME A CAUSE FOR MOURNING

Isaiah 32:12 — Loss of Vineyards

“Beat your breasts for the pleasant fields, for the fruitful vines,”

The people once enjoyed:

Fruitful land.

Now they mourn:

Its loss.

Cross References

Isaiah 16:9

Isaiah weeps over destroyed vineyards and harvests because judgment has silenced their former joy.

Micah 1:8

The prophet mourns openly and dramatically because of the devastation coming upon the people.

Joel 1:11

Farmers lament because wheat, barley, and harvest crops have been ruined.

Spiritual Principle

Blessings ignored in prosperity are often remembered deeply after loss.

XIII. THORNS AND BRIERS COVER THE LAND

Isaiah 32:13 — Joyful Houses Become Desolate

“And for the land of my people, overgrown with thorns and briers—yes, mourn for all the houses of joy and the bustling city.”

Thorns and briers represent:

Neglect.

Judgment.

Desolation.

Places of:

Joy.

Activity.

Celebration.

Become:

Empty.

Cross References

Isaiah 7:23

Valuable land becomes overgrown with briers and thorns when judgment devastates the region.

Genesis 3:18

After human sin, the ground produces thorns and thistles as part of creation's curse.

Hosea 9:6

Places once filled with possessions and prosperity become overgrown with thorns after devastation.

Spiritual Principle

Sin eventually leaves:

Thorns.

Where people expected:

Fruit.

XIV. THE CITY BECOMES A WASTELAND

Isaiah 32:14 — Human Security Deserted

“The fortress will be abandoned, the noisy city deserted; citadel and watchtower will become wastelands forever, a delight for donkeys, a pasture for flocks—”

Fortress.

City.

Citadel.

Watchtower.

All become:

Abandoned.

Animals occupy:

Former centers of human power.

Cross References

Isaiah 13:21

Ruined cities are pictured becoming habitats for wild animals after human glory disappears.

Zephaniah 2:14

Animals inhabit the ruins of former cities whose political strength and population have vanished.

Jeremiah 9:11

Jerusalem is warned that it can become a heap of ruins and desolate place because of persistent rebellion.

Spiritual Principle

No city is too busy to become quiet under judgment.

XV. THE SPIRIT IS POURED OUT FROM ON HIGH

Isaiah 32:15 — The Great Turning Point

“Until the Spirit is poured out on us from on high. Then the desert will become a fertile field, and the fertile field will seem like a forest.”

One word changes everything:

“Until.”

Desolation is not:

The final word.

The turning point is:

The Spirit.

When He is poured out:

Desert becomes:

Field.

Field becomes:

Forest.

Barrenness becomes:

Abundance.

Cross References

Joel 2:28

God promises to pour out His Spirit upon people broadly, resulting in prophetic witness and divine activity among generations.

Isaiah 44:3

God promises to pour water upon thirsty land and His Spirit upon the descendants of His people.

Ezekiel 36:26

God promises inner transformation through a new heart and renewed spirit, replacing hardness with responsiveness.

Spiritual Principle

Human effort can cultivate.

Only God's Spirit can transform at the deepest level.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

The Spirit can turn places we have labeled barren into places overflowing with life.

XVI. JUSTICE DWELLS IN THE WILDERNESS

Isaiah 32:16 — Righteousness Takes Root

“Justice will dwell in the wilderness, and righteousness will live in the fertile field.”

The Spirit's work is not merely:

Emotional.

Spectacular.

Personal.

It produces:

Justice.

Righteousness.

Cross References

Isaiah 11:4

The Messiah judges the poor with righteousness and defends the meek with justice.

Psalms 85:10

Mercy and truth meet together, while righteousness and peace are pictured embracing.

Isaiah 60:17

God promises a restored order in which peace and righteousness characterize leadership and society.

Spiritual Principle

A genuine work of the Spirit produces:

Righteousness.

Justice.

Not merely excitement.

XVII. RIGHTEOUSNESS PRODUCES PEACE

Isaiah 32:17 — Quietness and Confidence

“The fruit of righteousness will be peace; its effect will be quietness and confidence forever.”

Peace is called:

The fruit.

Righteousness is:

The root.

True peace does not come from:

Ignoring evil.

Redefining wrong.

Pretending everything is fine.

It grows from:

Righteousness.

Cross References

James 3:18

Those who make peace sow righteousness in peaceful conditions and reap righteous fruit.

Romans 5:1

Those justified by faith have peace with God through Jesus Christ.

Isaiah 26:3

God keeps the trusting and steadfast mind in perfect peace.

Spiritual Principle

Peace is not the absence of truth.

It is the fruit of righteousness.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

You cannot plant unrighteousness and expect to harvest lasting peace.

XVIII. GOD’S PEOPLE LIVE SECURELY

Isaiah 32:18 — Peaceful Dwelling Places

“My people will live in peaceful dwelling places, in secure homes, in undisturbed places of rest.”

The result of righteous rule and the Spirit’s work is:

Peace.

Security.

Rest.

Notice:

God calls them:

“My people.”

Cross References

Leviticus 26:5

God promises covenant blessing in which His people eat, live securely, and enjoy the fruit of the land.

Ezekiel 34:25

God promises a covenant of peace in which His people can dwell securely without fear.

Jeremiah 33:16

Judah and Jerusalem are promised salvation and security under God's righteous restoring work.

Spiritual Principle

God's peace is more than:

An inward feeling.

His final restoration includes:

Security.

Wholeness.

Rest.

XIX. PROUD STRENGTH IS STILL BROUGHT LOW

Isaiah 32:19 — The Forest and City Fall

“But hail will flatten the forest, and the city will be brought low.”

Even amid promises of:

Restoration.

Judgment remains for:

Pride.

Human strength.

Rebellion.

Cross References

Isaiah 30:30

God's judgment is pictured with thunderstorm, fire, cloudburst, and hail.

Revelation 16:21

Enormous hail appears in final judgment imagery against persistent rebellion.

Isaiah 28:2

God's instrument of judgment is compared to a destructive hailstorm and overwhelming flood.

Spiritual Principle

Restoration for God's people does not mean evil escapes judgment.

XX. BLESSED ARE THOSE WHO SOW BESIDE ALL WATERS

Isaiah 32:20 — Fruitful Labor Under God's Blessing

“Blessed are those who sow beside all waters, who let the ox and donkey range freely.”

The chapter ends with:

Sowing.

Labor.

Abundance.

Freedom.

Water is plentiful.

Fields are fruitful.

Animals range freely.

Cross References

Ecclesiastes 11:1

The wise are encouraged to act generously and faithfully, trusting that what is sent out may return in due season.

Psalms 1:3

The righteous person is compared to a tree planted by streams of water, producing fruit in season and prospering in what God appoints.

Isaiah 30:23

God promises rain, rich crops, and broad pasture as part of restoration.

Spiritual Principle

Restoration produces renewed:

Work.

Fruitfulness.

Hope.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

When God sends the water, keep sowing.

XXI. THE RIGHTEOUS KING AND CHRIST

Isaiah 32 begins with:

“A king will reign in righteousness.”

In its immediate setting, this expresses hope for:

Godly kingship.

But within Isaiah’s larger messianic vision, the language points beyond every imperfect human ruler.

Isaiah has already described the coming Davidic King in:

Isaiah 9.

Isaiah 11.

Jeremiah later speaks of:

The righteous Branch.

The New Testament reveals the ultimate righteous King as:

Jesus Christ.

Christ rules with:

Perfect justice.

Perfect righteousness.

Perfect wisdom.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Every righteous ruler is temporary.

Christ is the righteous King without end.

XXII. WHAT ISAIAH 32 TEACHES ABOUT LEADERSHIP

Godly leadership provides:

Spiritual Principle

The purpose of authority is not merely:

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Character eventually identifies the person more accurately than titles do.

XXIV. WHAT ISAIAH 32 TEACHES ABOUT COMPLACENCY

The women feel:

Secure.

But their security is:

Temporary.

Spiritual Principle

Comfort becomes dangerous when it destroys:

Watchfulness.

Prayer.

Dependence on God.

XXV. WHAT ISAIAH 32 TEACHES ABOUT THE SPIRIT

The Spirit changes:

Wilderness.

Fruitfulness.

Justice.

Righteousness.

Peace.

Security.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Where the Spirit truly transforms, barren things do not stay barren.

XXVI. WHAT ISAIAH 32 TEACHES ABOUT RIGHTEOUSNESS

Righteousness produces:

Peace.

Quietness.

Confidence.

Spiritual Principle

God's peace grows from:

God's order.

XXVII. WHAT ISAIAH 32 TEACHES ABOUT PEACE

Peace is not merely:

A treaty.

Silence after battle.

A temporary pause.

It is connected with:

Righteousness.

Justice.

Spirit-produced transformation.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Lasting peace needs deeper roots than temporary circumstances.

Good leadership creates conditions where truth and justice can flourish.

XXXI. SHELTER FROM THE WIND

People face:

Storms.

Heat.

Weariness.

Godly leadership should lessen:

The burden.

Not increase it.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Ask whether your influence makes life safer or harder for people entrusted to your care.

XXXII. STREAMS IN A DRY LAND

Dry places need:

Water.

People living through spiritual dryness need:

Truth.

Grace.

Encouragement.

Spiritual Principle

A righteous person can become refreshing in a spiritually dry environment.

XXXIII. SHADE IN A WEARY LAND

Shade does not remove:

The desert.

But it gives:

Relief within it.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

You may not be able to remove someone's entire desert.

You can still become shade.

XXXIV. EYES THAT SEE

In previous chapters Isaiah repeatedly described:

Blindness.

Here:

Sight returns.

Spiritual Principle

God's kingdom restores perception.

XXXV. EARS THAT LISTEN

Hearing is different from:

Listening.

The people had often:

Heard.

But refused:

To listen.

Now:

They do.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Spiritual maturity begins when hearing turns into listening.

XXXVI. FOOLS CALLED NOBLE

Isaiah imagines a society where moral labels have become:

Confused.

The righteous reign corrects:

That confusion.

Spiritual Principle

One sign of cultural restoration is the recovery of truthful moral language.

XXXVII. THE FOOL'S HEART

The fool's problem begins:

Inside.

His heart:

Plans evil.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Words and deeds eventually reveal what the heart has been planning.

XXXVIII. THE POOR WITH A JUST PLEA

The needy person can be:

Right.

Yet still be:

Oppressed.

Isaiah shows God sees:

The case.

The lies.

The injustice.

Spiritual Principle

God's justice does not depend on social status.

XXXIX. NOBLE PLANS

Good deeds often begin long before:

Action.

They begin in:

Purpose.

Intent.

Character.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

If you want noble actions, cultivate noble thoughts and plans.

XL. WOMEN AT EASE

The specific audience should be respected.

Isaiah addresses women living in:

Ease.

Carelessness.

Security.

The warning is not a condemnation of women as a class.

It confronts:

Complacency among those enjoying comfort while judgment approaches.

Spiritual Principle

The spiritual danger is:

Carelessness.

Not gender.

XLI. A YEAR CAN CHANGE EVERYTHING

Isaiah says:

In little more than a year.

Harvest will:

Fail.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Never build eternal confidence on temporary prosperity.

XLII. THE FAILED GRAPE HARVEST

They expected:

Wine.

Fruit.

Celebration.

Instead:

Loss.

Spiritual Principle

Earthly abundance should produce gratitude, not presumption.

XLIII. SACKCLOTH AFTER SILK

Comfort gives way to:

Mourning.

Crawford Bible Study Principle

Do not wait for the loss of comfort before learning humility.

XLIV. THORNS IN THE JOYFUL CITY

Places once full of:

Celebration.

Become:

Overgrown.

Spiritual Principle

A society can move from abundance to abandonment more quickly than expected.

XLV. “UNTIL THE SPIRIT”

These may be the most important words in the chapter.

Everything before them shows:

What humanity becomes without divine renewal.

Everything after them shows:

What God can restore.

Key Truth

The Spirit of God reverses what sin and careless leadership have damaged, producing righteousness, clarity, fruitfulness, peace, and security beneath the reign of the righteous King.

LXXVII. FINAL APPLICATION

Isaiah Chapter 32 begins with:

A King.

And ends with:

A field.

Between those two pictures lies:

The transformation of a people.

The King reigns:

Righteously.

That matters.

Leadership always:

Influences.

Shapes.

Affects.

Those beneath it.

Godly leadership becomes:

Shelter from wind.

Refuge from storm.

Water in dryness.

Shade in weariness.

That is a good test for anyone with authority.

Pastor.

Parent.

Employer.

Teacher.

Leader.

Ask:

Do people under my influence experience:

Shelter?

Or:

Storm?

Then Isaiah speaks about:

Character.

Fools eventually reveal:

Folly.

Misers reveal:

Schemes.

Noble people reveal:

Noble deeds.

God is not impressed by:

Titles.

Labels.

Reputations.

He looks at:

Character.

Then comes the warning to the comfortable.

People at ease assumed:

Harvest.

Fruit.

Security.

Would continue.

Isaiah says:

Do not confuse:

Comfort.

With:

Safety.

Prosperity.

Godliness.

Routine.

With:

Guarantee.

Then everything becomes:

Desolate.

Thorns.

Briers.

Empty towers.

Abandoned cities.

One word.

“Until.”

Never forget:

“Until.”

The field is barren:

The city is empty:

The people are struggling:

Until.

Until what?

“Until the Spirit is poured out on us from on high.”

righteousness produces peace, and God's people live securely while faithfully sowing under His blessing.
