

# Introduction to Genesis Chapter 10

Genesis chapter 10, often called the “Table of Nations,” is one of the most important genealogical passages in all of Scripture. At first glance, it may appear to be simply a list of names and descendants, but in reality, it provides a foundational map of how the nations of the earth were formed after the flood. This chapter traces the spread of humanity from the three sons of Noah—Shem, Ham, and Japheth—showing how all people groups ultimately originate from a single family.

This chapter reveals that God is not only concerned with individuals but also with nations, cultures, and civilizations. Each name represents the beginning of tribes, territories, and kingdoms that would shape the ancient world. From Japheth come many of the coastland and distant nations; from Ham emerge powerful early civilizations, including those connected to regions like Egypt and Canaan; and from Shem comes the lineage that will eventually lead to Abraham and the people of Israel.

A key figure introduced in this chapter is Nimrod, described as a mighty hunter and the founder of some of the earliest kingdoms, including Babel. His rise signals the beginning of organized human power and rebellion, which will be further developed in the following chapter with the Tower of Babel. This subtle transition shows how humanity, though multiplied and spread out, continues to struggle with pride and independence from God.

Genesis 10 also emphasizes an important theological truth: the diversity of nations and languages was part of God’s unfolding plan. Though the division of languages is detailed in chapter 11, this chapter organizes the nations according to their lands, languages, clans, and peoples—highlighting God’s sovereignty over the structure of human civilization.

Ultimately, Genesis 10 sets the stage for the rest of the biblical narrative. While it documents the expansion of the nations, it also quietly narrows the focus toward one specific lineage—Shem’s line—which will become central to God’s redemptive plan. From the many, God will soon call one man, Abraham, through whom all nations of the earth will be blessed.

In summary, Genesis chapter 10 is not just a genealogy—it is a declaration of humanity’s shared origin, God’s sovereign ordering of the nations, and the beginning of the story that leads to redemption.

## Genesis 10:1–2

“(1) This is the account of Shem, Ham and Japheth, Noah’s sons, who themselves had sons after the flood. (2) The sons of Japheth: Gomer, Magog, Madai, Javan, Tubal, Meshek and Tiras.”

**The Context:** Chapter 10 is famously known as the "**Table of Nations.**" While it may look like a dry list of names, it is actually a foundational document for understanding world history and geography. This is the fulfillment of God’s command to "be fruitful and multiply." Verse 1 resets the story around Noah's sons, and verse 2 begins with **Japheth**, whose descendants generally migrated toward the north and west—becoming the peoples of Europe and Northern Asia.

**The Meaning of the Lineage:** In simple American English: "This is the official family record for Noah’s three sons after the flood. They didn't just stay in one place; they started having kids and moving out. Japheth’s family was the first one listed. His seven sons—Gomer, Magog, Madai, Javan, Tubal, Meshek, and Tiras—eventually became the founders of various tribes and nations that settled in the areas we now know as Turkey, Greece, and Europe."

- "**This is the account**": In Hebrew, this is *Toledot*. It’s a formal marker used throughout Genesis to signal a major new section. It tells the reader, "Pay attention; a new branch of the human story is growing here."
- "**Sons after the flood**": This signifies **The Population Boom**. After the world was emptied, it began to refill. This list proves that the "New World" was built entirely by these three families.
- **The Sons of Japheth**: This signifies **The Expansion**. Japheth’s name means "to enlarge" or "to expand." True to his name, his descendants occupied the most land, spreading out across the "Coastlands" and the northern regions.

### What This Means for Us Today

- **The Unity of Humanity:** Chapter 10 reminds us that every person on earth—regardless of race, culture, or language—shares a common grandfather in Noah. We are all "cousins" in the grand scheme of history. It is the ultimate biblical argument against racism: **We all come from the same boat.**
- **God of the Nations:** God doesn't just care about individuals; He cares about *peoples*. By naming these sons and their nations, the Bible shows that God is tracking the development of human society. He knows the names of the founders of every culture.
- **The Geography of Destiny:** The names in verse 2 (like Javan, which is the Hebrew word for Greece, or Madai, which refers to the Medes) show that the Bible is grounded in **real history**

**and real geography.** These aren't mythical places; they are the roots of the world we live in today.

**How This Relates to Today** When you look at a map of Europe or the Middle East, you are looking at the "ripples" of Genesis 10. These names aren't just ancient trivia; they represent the **diversity** God intended for the world. He didn't want everyone to stay in one small village; He wanted a world filled with different languages, customs, and lands.

**Key Lesson** History is not accidental; it is the unfolding of families into nations under the sovereign eye of God, reminding us that we are all part of one massive, interconnected human family.

**Japheth's family is moving toward the coastlands.**

## Genesis 10:3–4

“(3) The sons of Gomer: Ashkenaz, Riphath and Togarmah. (4) The sons of Javan: Elishah, Tarshish, the Kittim and the Rodanim.”

**The Context:** We are looking at the "grandchildren" of Japheth. As these families grew, they didn't just stay in one tent; they began to name regions and cities after themselves. If you look at an ancient map, these names correspond to the northern and western frontiers of the biblical world. This is the beginning of what historians call the "Indo-European" peoples.

**The Meaning of the Grandchildren:** In simple American English: "Gomer's three sons—Ashkenaz, Riphath, and Togarmah—moved north into the areas around the Black Sea (modern-day Turkey and Russia). Javan's sons—Elishah, Tarshish, the Kittim, and the Rodanim—moved toward the Mediterranean Sea. They became the famous 'sea-faring' people, settling in places like Greece, Cyprus, Rhodes, and even as far as Spain."

- **"Ashkenaz":** This name is still used today (Ashkenazi) to refer to Jews of Central and Eastern European descent. Originally, it referred to the area near the Black Sea.
- **"Javan":** In Hebrew, this is the word for **Greece**. Whenever you see "Javan" in the Bible, it's talking about the Greeks.
- **"Tarshish":** This name pops up later in the story of Jonah (he tries to flee there). It represents the "edge of the world" to the west—likely Spain.
- **"Kittim and Rodanim":** These names refer to the islands of **Cyprus** and **Rhodes**.

### What This Means for Us Today

- **The Expansion of Horizon:** Japheth's family were the explorers. They were the ones who looked at the ocean and the mountains and decided to see what was on the other side. It shows that God built an **adventurous spirit** into humanity.

- **The Root of Diversity:** Even within one family (Japheth's), we see the start of different sub-cultures. One group liked the mountains (Gomer), and one group liked the sea (Javan). God loves the "micro-diversity" that happens as families grow and adapt to their environments.
- **A Grounded Faith:** These verses prove that the Bible isn't a book of "Once upon a time." It uses real geographical markers. You can get on a plane today and fly to the lands settled by these men.

**How This Relates to Today** It's easy to feel like we are all disconnected, but these verses show that the "world powers" of history—from the Greeks to the Europeans—all started as brothers in a single family. It reframes "Global History" as a "Family Reunion" that hasn't happened yet.

**Key Lesson** God's blessing of "filling the earth" looks like migration and exploration; He purposefully scattered the descendants of Noah to turn the whole planet into a home for humanity.

**Japheth's family has reached the "Coastlands."**

## Genesis 10:6–8

“(6) The sons of Ham: Cush, Egypt, Put and Canaan. (7) The sons of Cush: Seba, Havilah, Sabtah, Raamah and Sabteka. The sons of Raamah: Sheba and Dedan. (8) Cush was the father of Nimrod, who became a mighty warrior on the earth.”

**The Context:** We now move from the "Coastlands" of Japheth to the southern and eastern regions settled by **Ham**. While Japheth's line moved toward Europe, Ham's descendants populated Africa and parts of the Middle East (Mesopotamia and the Levant). This section is crucial because it introduces the most powerful civilizations that will interact with Israel throughout the rest of the Bible: **Egypt, Ethiopia (Cush), and Canaan.**

**The Meaning of the Nations and the Warrior:** In simple American English: "Ham's four sons—Cush, Egypt, Put, and Canaan—founded some of the most famous empires in history. Cush's family settled in Africa (Sudan/Ethiopia area), Egypt settled the Nile, Put moved toward Libya, and Canaan settled the land that would later be promised to Abraham. Then, the list pauses to focus on a specific grandson of Ham named **Nimrod**. He wasn't just a farmer; he was the world's first 'superstar' leader—a man who built a reputation for being incredibly strong and powerful."

- **"Cush, Egypt, Put, and Canaan":** This signifies **The Powerhouses**. These are the "Big Four" of the ancient world. Nearly every conflict in the Old Testament involves one of these groups.
- **"Cush was the father of Nimrod":** This signifies **A Shift in Leadership**. Up until now, leaders were "Patriarchs" (fathers of families). Nimrod is the first "King" figure—someone who gathers people under his personal strength rather than just family ties.
- **"A mighty warrior":** In Hebrew, this is *Gibbor*, meaning a giant or a hero. Nimrod represents the birth of **Imperialism**—the idea of one man ruling over many.

## What This Means for Us Today

- **The Diversity of Excellence:** Ham's descendants built the most advanced early civilizations. From the pyramids of Egypt to the massive cities of Mesopotamia, this lineage shows that God gave humanity the capacity for **incredible engineering and organization**.
- **The Danger of "Might":** Nimrod is a complicated figure. While being "mighty" can be a gift, the Bible often uses Nimrod as a warning. He was the first to create a kingdom based on human power rather than divine guidance. It teaches us that **talent without humility leads to tyranny**.
- **Connected Roots:** Seeing "Egypt" and "Canaan" listed as brothers reminds us that these warring nations actually came from the same house. It's a tragic reminder of how quickly family can turn into "enemies" when God is left out of the picture.

**How This Relates to Today** When we think of "World History," we often start with the Great Empires. Genesis 10:6–8 tells us exactly where those empires got their start. It reminds us that no matter how "mighty" a leader or a nation becomes, they all have a beginning that traces back to a single family.

**Key Lesson** God allows for the rise of great nations and "mighty" individuals, but the "Table of Nations" reminds us that all human power is temporary and rooted in a shared, humble ancestry.

**Nimrod is just getting started. He's about to build the world's first "Super-Cities."**

## Genesis 10:9–12

“(9) He was a mighty hunter before the Lord; that is why it is said, ‘Like Nimrod, a mighty hunter before the Lord.’ (10) The centers of his kingdom were Babylon, Uruk, Akkad and Kalneh, in Shinar. (11) From that land he went to Assyria, where he built Nineveh, Rehoboth Ir, Calah (12) and Resen, which is between Nineveh and Calah—which is the great city.”

**The Context:** While the other descendants of Noah were mostly "settling" lands, Nimrod was **conquering and building**. This is a pivotal shift in the Bible. We move from a world of nomadic families to a world of **urban empires**. Nimrod establishes the two greatest rival powers to God's people in the Old Testament: **Babylon** (the center of false religion and pride) and **Assyria/Nineveh** (the center of military cruelty).

**The Meaning of the Kingdom and the Cities:** In simple American English: "Nimrod was so famous that people used his name as a proverb for being a 'tough guy.' He wasn't just hunting animals; he was 'hunting' power and people. He started the first real empire in a place called Shinar (modern Iraq), building famous cities like Babylon and Akkad. Then he expanded north and built Nineveh—a city so huge it was known as 'the great city.' Nimrod was the world's first true 'Empire Builder.'"

- **"A mighty hunter before the Lord":** This signifies **Ambition**. In Hebrew, the phrase "before the Lord" can mean "in God's face" or "in defiance of." Nimrod wasn't just a sportsman; he was a "hunter of souls" who established a system of government that relied on human strength rather than divine providence.
- **"The centers of his kingdom":** This signifies **The Birth of Civilization**. This is the first time the word "Kingdom" (*Malkut*) is used in the Bible. Nimrod represents the transition from a tribal society to a centralized, political state.
- **"Babylon and Nineveh":** This signifies **The Root of Adversaries**. By mentioning these cities, the author is telling the original readers: "You know those empires that keep attacking us? This is where they came from. They were built on the ambition of one 'mighty' man."

### What This Means for Us Today

- **The Trap of Personality Cults:** Nimrod was the first "celebrity." People talked about him ("that is why it is said..."). It shows how easily humanity is mesmerized by strength, charisma, and "bigness." We have to be careful not to value "might" over "mercy."
- **City vs. Wilderness:** In Genesis, "The City" is often a place where people go to try and live without God (starting with Cain). Nimrod's cities were built for protection and power. It reminds us that while cities are centers of culture, they can also become centers of **collective pride**.
- **The Spread of Influence:** Nimrod didn't stay in one place. He went from Shinar to Assyria. Power is naturally "expansive." It never says, "I have enough." It always wants the next territory.

**How This Relates to Today** We still see "Nimrods" today—leaders who build massive monuments to their own names and create systems of power that demand total loyalty. Genesis 10:9–12 tells us that this "Imperial Spirit" is very old and very dangerous.

It also speaks to **Human Potential**. It is incredible that so soon after the Flood, humans were building complex urban centers like Akkad and Nineveh. God gave us the ability to build "great cities," but He also wants us to remember that no city is truly great if it is built on defiance.

**Key Lesson** True greatness is not measured by the height of our walls or the size of our "kingdoms," but by whether our "hunting" (our ambitions) is done in service to others or in defiance of God.

**Nimrod has built the cities. Now, we look at the people who will live in them—the descendants of Canaan.**

# Genesis 10:15–19

“(15) Canaan was the father of Sidon his firstborn, and of the Hittites, (16) Jebusites, Amorites, Girgashites, (17) Hivites, Arkites, Sinites, (18) Arvadites, Zemarites and Hamathites. Later the Canaanite clans scattered (19) and the borders of Canaan reached from Sidon toward Gerar as far as Gaza, and then toward Sodom, Gomorrah, Admah and Zeboyim, as far as Lasha.”

**The Context:** If you’ve ever read the rest of the Old Testament and wondered where all the "ites" came from (the people Israel fought to enter the Promised Land), this is their **birth certificate**. This list identifies the various tribes that occupied the land of Canaan. It also gives a very specific geographic "box" for their territory, stretching from the Mediterranean coast down to the infamous cities of the plain (Sodom and Gomorrah).

**The Meaning of the Clans and the Borders:** In simple American English: "Canaan had eleven sons who started their own tribes. You’ll recognize their names later in the Bible—like the Hittites and the Jebusites. They started in the north at Sidon and spread all the way down the coast to Gaza. They also pushed inland toward the Jordan Valley, right up to the area where Sodom and Gomorrah would eventually be built. This was the 'Canaanite territory' that everyone in the ancient world knew about."

- **"Sidon his firstborn":** Sidon was a major Phoenician port city. It represents the "wealth and trade" of the Canaanites.
- **"Jebusites, Amorites, Hittites":** These are the major "power players" Israel would encounter centuries later. By naming them here, the Bible is showing that their history is deeply rooted in the post-flood world.
- **"Sodom and Gomorrah":** This is a **proleptic** (forward-looking) mention. The author is signaling to the reader: "These people settled in the very places that would later become synonymous with wickedness and judgment."

## What This Means for Us Today

- **The Geography of Promise:** This "Table" defines the land that God would later promise to Abraham. Before God gave the land away, He identified exactly who was living there. It shows that **God’s plan for the future is always aware of the reality of the present.**
- **The Complexity of Conflict:** These verses remind us that the "enemies" of Israel weren't just random villains; they were a diverse group of cousins who had built a sophisticated civilization over hundreds of years.
- **The Influence of Environment:** The Canaanites settled in the most fertile and strategically located "land bridge" in the world. Their location made them wealthy but also prone to the pride and corruption that often come with being at the center of global trade.

**How This Relates to Today** When we see the names of these cities—Gaza, Sidon, Hamath—we are seeing names that are still in the news today. Genesis 10:15–19 reminds us that the **tensions of the Middle East** have roots that go back thousands of years. It's a call to view history not as a series of random events, but as a long, connected family story.

**Key Lesson** Roots matter; the places we settle and the cultures we build are the "soil" in which our descendants will either flourish or struggle.

**We've seen the Coastlands (Japheth) and the Empires (Ham). Now, we finish with the "Line of Promise."**

## Genesis 10:20–24

“(20) These are the sons of Ham by their clans and languages, in their territories and nations. (21) Sons were also born to Shem, whose older brother was Japheth; Shem was the ancestor of all the sons of Eber. (22) The sons of Shem: Elam, Ashur, Arphaxad, Lud and Aram. (23) The sons of Aram: Uz, Hul, Gether and Meshek. (24) Arphaxad was the father of Shelah, and Shelah the father of Eber.”

**The Context:** Verse 20 concludes the massive section on **Ham**, noting that humanity has now successfully diversified into different languages and territories. Verse 21 then introduces the final and most significant branch of the family: **Shem**. The text specifically highlights that Shem is the ancestor of **Eber**, which is the linguistic root for the word "**Hebrew**." This is the line of the "Promise"—the family through which the Bible's story will focus for the next 2,000 years.

**The Meaning of the Semitic Roots:** In simple American English: "After finishing with Ham's huge family, the Bible turns to Shem. He's the one who stayed in the Middle Eastern regions. His sons founded famous groups: Elam (Persia), Ashur (the original Assyrians), and Aram (the Syrians). But the most important person in this list is **Eber**. By mentioning him, the author is telling us, 'This is where the Hebrew people come from.' This isn't just a list of nations; it's the specific path that leads us straight to Abraham."

- "**Ancestor of all the sons of Eber**": This signifies **Identity**. This is a massive "shout-out" to the Hebrew people. It establishes their ancient pedigree and connects them directly to the "blessed" son of Noah.
- "**Elam, Ashur, Arphaxad, Lud, and Aram**": These signify **The Middle Eastern Hub**. These names represent the Persians, Assyrians, Chaldeans (Arphaxad), Lydians, and Syrians. These are the neighbors and often the rivals of the future nation of Israel.
- "**Uz**": This signifies **Literary History**. One of the sons of Aram is Uz. This is likely the same "Land of Uz" where the story of **Job** takes place. It shows that even the "wisdom literature" of the Bible has roots in this chapter.

## What This Means for Us Today

- **The Selection of Grace:** Out of all the "mighty" nations of Ham and the "expanding" nations of Japheth, God chooses to focus the rest of the Bible on this one specific branch of Shem. It teaches us that **God's plan often starts small**. He uses one family to eventually reach all the others.
- **The Importance of Heritage:** By tracking the line from Shem to Eber to Arphaxad, the Bible shows that **God keeps His promises over long periods of time**. The blessing Noah spoke over Shem in Chapter 9 is being meticulously tracked through these names.
- **Names as Markers:** In the ancient world, your name was your destiny. To be a "Son of Eber" meant you were part of a lineage that was looking for something more than just building empires (like Nimrod). It was a lineage defined by its relationship with God.

**How This Relates to Today** When we use the term "Semitic" today (as in anti-Semitism), we are referring to the descendants of Shem. This passage reminds us that the Jewish people and many Middle Eastern cultures share a deeply rooted, common history. It calls for a recognition of the shared humanity behind the modern headlines.

**Key Lesson** While the world was busy building cities and empires, God was quietly preserving a specific family line; the "line of Shem" reminds us that God's most important work often happens in the quiet continuity of a faithful family tree.

**The line is moving closer to Abraham. We only have a few names left!**

## Genesis 10:25–28

“(25) Two sons were born to Eber: One was named Peleg, because in his time the earth was divided; his brother was named Joktan. (26) Joktan was the father of Almodad, Sheleph, Hazarmaveth, Jerah, (27) Hadoram, Uzal, Diklah, (28) Obal, Abimael, Sheba...”

**The Context:** We are now zooming in on the line of **Eber** (the root of the "Hebrews"). The text splits here into two directions. One line (Joktan) leads to the Arabian tribes, while the other line (Peleg) will eventually lead to Abraham. Verse 25 contains one of the most debated phrases in Genesis: **"in his time the earth was divided."** This likely refers to the linguistic and territorial scattering that happens in the very next chapter at the **Tower of Babel**.

**The Meaning of the Division and the Tribes:** In simple American English: "Eber had two sons who represented a major split in history. He named one **Peleg** (which means 'Division') because during his life, the people of the earth stopped living in one place and started scattering into different nations and languages. Peleg's brother, **Joktan**, went on to have thirteen sons. They became the founders of the great tribes of the Arabian Peninsula, including the famous kingdom of **Sheba**."

- **"Peleg... because the earth was divided":** This signifies **The Great Scattering**. While some suggest this refers to the physical "continental drift," most biblical scholars believe it refers to the division of humanity into distinct language groups and nations following the disaster at Babel (Genesis 11).
- **"Joktan":** This signifies **The Desert Settlers**. Joktan's descendants stayed in the East and South, becoming the ancestors of the Arab peoples. Many of the names in verses 26-28 (like Hazarmaveth and Sheba) are still recognizable as locations in modern-day Yemen and Saudi Arabia.
- **"Sheba":** This signifies **Future Significance**. This is the first mention of the land that would later produce the famous Queen of Sheba who visited King Solomon. It shows that even these "side branches" of the family tree were destined for greatness.

## What This Means for Us Today

- **The God of the "Hidden" Branches:** Usually, the Bible only follows the "main" line (the one leading to Jesus). But here, God takes the time to name every one of Joktan's thirteen sons. It reminds us that **God sees and values every branch of the human family**, even the ones that aren't at the center of the "main story."
- **The "Naming" of Seasons:** Eber named his son after a world event (the division of the earth). It teaches us that our lives are often shaped by the "times" we live in. Peleg carried the "name" of a global shift his entire life. It's a reminder that we are all part of a larger historical narrative.
- **The Foundation of the Middle East:** By listing Joktan's sons, the Bible provides the "DNA" for the Arabian world. It shows that the Hebrews (Peleg) and the Arabs (Joktan) are literally "brother tribes" who share the same father, Eber.

**How This Relates to Today** The phrase "the earth was divided" reminds us that **unity is fragile**. Whether it was a linguistic division or a physical one, Chapter 10 tells us that the world we see today—full of borders, different languages, and separate nations—is the result of a specific historical turning point. We were once "one," and the rest of the Bible is essentially the story of God trying to bring that "divided" family back together.

**Key Lesson** History is marked by "divisions" that define our nations and identities, but beneath every border and language barrier lies a shared brotherhood that traces back to the same family table.

**We are at the very end of the "Table of Nations."**

## Genesis 10:29–32

“(29) Ophir, Havilah and Jobab. All these were sons of Joktan. (30) The region where they lived stretched from Mesha toward Sephar, in the eastern hill country. (31) These are the

sons of Shem by their clans and languages, in their territories and nations. (32) These are the clans of Noah's sons, according to their lines of descent, within their nations. From these the nations spread out over the earth after the flood."

#### The Context:

We reach the conclusion of the "Table of Nations." After detailing the descendants of Japheth (the coastlands), Ham (the empires), and Shem (the line of promise), the Bible zooms out to show the finished map. Verse 30 specifically places the descendants of Joktan in the "eastern hill country," which solidifies their identity as the early Arabian tribes. Verse 32 acts as the official "seal" on the chapter, confirming that every ethnic group, language, and nation on Earth today traces its DNA back to this single family.

#### The Meaning of the Final Gathering:

In simple American English: "The list finishes with the last of Joktan's sons, including Ophir (famous for its gold later in the Bible). They settled in the mountains and deserts to the East. Then, the Bible summarizes everything: 'That's it. These are the families of Shem, Ham, and Japheth. From these three branches, every nation on the planet grew and spread out after the flood was over.' It's the ultimate 'Family Tree' for the entire human race."

- "Ophir and Havilah": These signify Resources. These regions became legendary for their gold, precious stones, and spices. It shows that as the nations spread, they discovered and developed the natural wealth God placed in the earth.
- "Clans and languages... territories and nations": This signifies Structured Diversity. God didn't just want a "blob" of people; He wanted organized societies with unique identities. Notice the fourfold division: Family (clans), Communication (languages), Location (territories), and Government (nations).
- "Spread out over the earth": This signifies Fulfilled Mission. Noah's family did exactly what God told them to do in Chapter 9:1. They didn't just survive; they colonized the planet.

### **What This Means for Us Today**

- The End of "Primitive" History: Chapter 10 marks the end of what scholars call "Primeval History." We are moving from the "Cosmic" scale (Creation, Fall, Flood) to the "National" scale. From here on out, the Bible will focus on how God interacts with these specific nations to bring about His plan.
- The Equality of Origin: No nation can claim they are "native" to the earth in a way that excludes others. Whether a nation is powerful or small, they all began at the same table in the same region. This is the biblical foundation for Human Rights—we all share the same "Blue Blood" of Noah.
- The Sovereignty of Geography: Acts 17:26 in the New Testament says that God "marked out their appointed times in history and the boundaries of their lands." Chapter 10 is the record of God doing exactly that. He guided the migrations to ensure that every corner of the earth would be reached.

## How This Relates to Today

In a world that feels increasingly divided by borders and "us vs. them" mentalities, Genesis 10 stands as a reminder that borders are secondary to brotherhood. We are many nations, but we are one family.

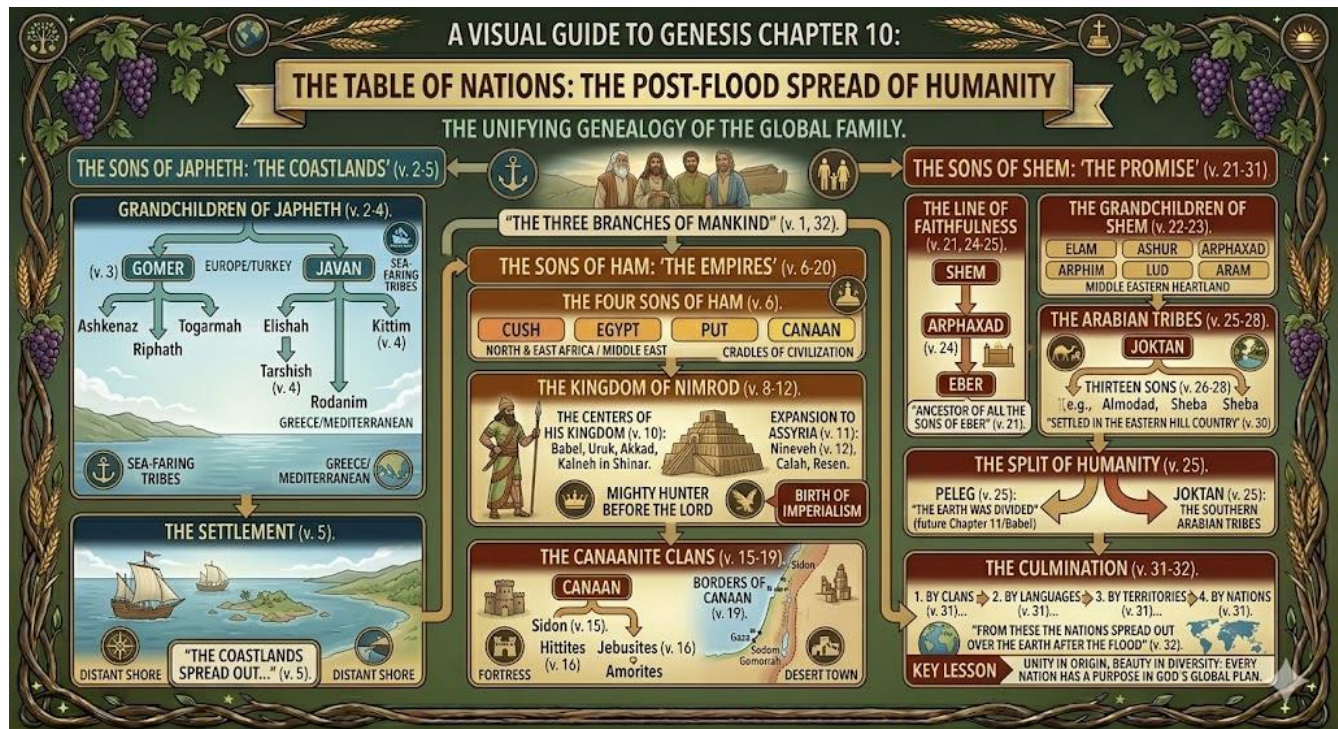
## Key Lesson
